Ontario County Votes To Keep Ban On Liquor BRAMPTON, Ont., June 16 — (CP) — The Canada Temperance Act, which prohibits the sale of beer and liquor, will remain in force in Peel County. Unofficial figures in today's plebiscite to determine whether the Act, first voted into force in this mainly rural county in 1914, should be revoked or not gave the vote as 8,407 against revocation and 8,121 for revocation.

Maritime-Boston Train Services MONCTON, N. B., June 16 — Commencing Sunday June 22nd, the present train service between the Maritime Provinces and Boston via Saint John and the Gulf will be operated daily instead of daily except Sunday, according to an announcement from regional headquarters of the Canadian National Railways here, leaving Halifax by the Scotian (train no. 50) at 8:15 a.m., Truro 10:05 a.m., Amherst 12:22 p.m., Moncton 2:45 p.m. on week days (train no. 13) and 4:30 p.m. on Sundays (train no. 40) arrive Saint John 5:35 p.m. daily except Sunday and 7:15 p.m. on Sundays, leave there 8:00 p.m. daily, arriving Boston 7:45 (Eastern Time), the following morning.
