CRAPAUD.—Rev. R. T. Dobie will conduct divine service in the Church of England at Crapaud on Sunday morning next at 11 o'clock.

POLICE COURT.—At the Charlottetown Police Court yesterday morning, one drunk, Peter Keenan, was fined \$5.00 or 20 days. The prohibition case of Sarah J. Higgins was dismissed and E. Foster was fined \$100. for first offence against prohibition act.

INWARD TRAINS.—The western express arrived in Charlottetown yesterday at 11.30 a. m., on time; the Summerside accommodation at 3.15 p. m., on time. The Summerside special from the Minto arrived here at 3.30 p. m. and the Georgetown special from the Earl Grey at 12.40 p. m.

BURNS' ANNIVERSARY.—The Burns' anniversary celebration will be held in the Opera House on next Thursday and Friday evenings, and judging by the array of first class talent taking part it should at least prove equal, if not superior, to any of the excellent concerts and dramas previously held under the auspices of the Caledonian Club, so all who wish to spend a pleasant evening should attend "Scotland's dalea and Scotland's hills for me."

SERIOUS ACCIDENT.—A very painful accident occurred at Donnelly's Road a short distance from Peake's Station a few days ago. It appears that at the home of Owen Trainor, an old lantern was in use that had been fitted out with a homemade wick which was not the best, and besides, the place where the oil is poured in had lost its cap. On the date in question and at about 9 p. m., Mrs. Trainor picked up the lantern which had been lighted. The sudden lifting of the article caused the flame to dart into the bowl. Immediately the oil took fire and exploded. The oil and flame came out the little oil hole with great force and spread over Mrs. Trainor's left arm. She was very badly burned from the shoulder to the fingers, but is doing as well as can be expected.

MRS. MAGARELL.—The death occurred at an early hour Tuesday morning, at the Infirmary, of Mrs. Eliza Magarell, widow of the late Richard Magarell, of the Quinpool Road Nurseries, says a Halifax exchange. Mrs. Magarell had been ailing for a few weeks, and she had been removed to the Infirmary with the intention of an operation, but owing to her growing weakness the operation was found impossible. The deceased was the daughter of Samuel Collings of Charlottetown, P. E. I. She is survived by two sons, Richard and James living at home, and three daughters, Mrs. G. A. Davis, of New York; Mrs. Robert Burns and Mrs. Marshall Gannon of this city, who have the dearest sympathy of a large circle of friends in their bereavement. Mrs. Magarell was a woman of beautiful character, and gently beloved by all who knew her. She was a member of the Church of England and identified with St. Paul's Church.

ABLE LECTURERS.—Notwithstanding the rain of yesterday the Y. M. C. A. Assembly Hall, says a Halifax exchange, was well filled with a most attentive and appreciative audience of young men, who came to hear the ever popular Principal of Pine Hill, Dr. Clarence MacKinnon.
