HENRY McKenzie, Lot 48, was in town yesterday and reports the snow drifts in that settlement from twenty to thirty feet in height. Mr. McKenzie had much difficulty in making his way to the city, as many parts of the roads have not yet been broken.

ANDREW Carnegie has refused to have anything to do with improvements in Pittsburg which would bring him into even remote connection with the liquor traffic. The head of a large concern in Pittsburg has just returned from New York, whither he went to see Mr. Carnegie about erecting a hotel there larger than any one in the City, but he was told by Mr. Carnegie, while he thought such a building would make great returns financially, he would have nothing to do with it, since it would be necessary to have a liquor license in the hotel, and he would not lend his name or money to anything connected with the trade.

THIS is from The St. John Sun, Conservative: The Prince Edward Island legislature comprises thirty members. The re-organized Peters ministry includes nine ministers, three with office, six without. Assuming that the nine members of the administration have confidence in themselves, they require the support of only six out of the twenty-one private members to assure them of a majority. With these six they do not need the vote of the speaker. A proportionate number of ministers in the dominion house of commons would be sixty-three, and in the imperial parliament two hundred and one.

At the annual meeting of the Provincial Tourist's Association a few nights ago in St. John a very interesting time was spent discussing matters of importance in the tourist business. The reports showed that good work was being done in the way of the distribution of booklets etc. The treasurer's report showed the receipts for 1904 \$6,100.89 and the expenditures \$1,506.11. The Old Home Week had been successful and President Bullock said an effort would be made to make it an annual institution. Premier Tweedie complimented the St. John Association on the work they were doing but said he did not think it was broad enough in its aims. He thought there ought to be a provincial association. He thought government assistance to the St. John organization had been well placed but it did not cover the ground it ought. The Intercolonial and Canadian Pacific ought to assist to the utmost of their powers as regards the rate of travel. The Ocean Limited which the I. C. R. placed on the route last season was the best venture ever tried and opened the eyes of many tourists to the beauties of the province. J. D. Hazen, M. P. P., suggested that such a provincial tourist association as had been spoken of might be attached to the Surveyor General's office. Hon. G. F. Hill, Charlotte, touched on the desirability of having a provincial park for the preservation of game, fish and forest. He and Hon. Mr. Dunn were appointed to survey a tract of land at the head of the Tobique for such purposes, but they were unable to go on. He did not want to see many more sportsmen coming into New Brunswick. He wanted to see the big game preserved. Some discussion took place about the relative merits of the region at the head waters of the Tobique and the Restigouche and between the St. Croix and St. John rivers for a provincial park. The opinion of the meeting seemed to favor the latter.
