### A MILLION GUINEAS.

The Methodists of the United Kingdom, relatively a numerous body among the Non Conformists in that country, set out to begin the new century with a fund of one million guineas to be known as the Wesleyan Twentieth Century Fund. A recent number of the London Times shows that it is extremely probable that the gigantic task will be accomplished within the specified time, that is, by January 1, 1901.

In London, in October last a conference was held at which it was decided to hold central meetings in the 34 Methodist districts of the United Kingdom, and local meetings in the 814 Methodist circuits to promote subscriptions to the fund. Down to a few weeks ago a total of £714,125 had been promised in 697 circuits, leaving 117 districts to be heard from. Evidently the British Methodists are generous givers and able to give as well.

The object of the fund and an outline of the manner in which it will be disposed of when collected are of interest. No part of the fund will be devoted to the support of the regular ministry. Some £300,000 goes to assist in the purchase of sites and the erection of churches, Sunday schools and soldiers' and sailors' homes; £200,000 for educational work and enterprise; £100,000 for foreign missions; £100,000 for home missions and temperance work; £50,000 for development of the work in the Wesleyan Children's Home and £250,000 for the purchase of a site in West London, near Regent Street and the erection of a central Wesleyan Hall.

It is a great movement aside from its denominational aspects, and in every way worthy of this great and progressive branch of the Christian church. It cannot fail to promote both the interests of the Methodist body and the cause of religion generally, especially along the lines of a missionary, temperance and philanthropic work. Doubtless, too, it will have a stimulating effect upon other religious bodies, inspiring them to greater zeal, effort and more generous giving. THE GUARDIAN gladly notes that the Twentieth Century Fund may now be classed as an assured success.

Sir Charles Tupper has proposed to Premier Laurier that the redistribution bill and other controversial measures be dropped for the time and the House prorogued, so as to give the government an opportunity to prepare for the resumed meeting of the International Conference in August next. The Premier promised to submit the proposition to his colleagues. It seems most desirable that in the Conference the Canadian representatives should be able to feel that they have the entire country behind them and Sir Charles appears patriotically desirous to promote that end.

Read the letter of A Member of the Temperance Alliance, which appears in another column of this issue. It shows up in their true light the much vaunted amendments to the Regulation Act for which Mr. Farquharson claims credit, and the contrast between the amendments submitted to him and those he passed.

The Patriot says:—

Deceased was the second daughter of Robert Crozier, Hamilton.

The following reference to the Bq Osberga is copied from an Australian paper of a recent date. Mr. Basil Kelly of Sunnyside, is mate of the Osberga which sailed from St. John, N. B., in Dec. last. Early yesterday morning this vessel, her name not having been previously ascertained owing to the prevailing heavy weather, reached the Bay, in tow. Captain McKenzie had a heavy weather passage to report. St. John was left on 16th December, and gales of hurricane violence set in, during which the jibboom was lost, bringing down the foretopgallant mast and cordage, the wreckage creating other damage aloft. In another hard struggle with wind and sea, the deck load of timber was swept away, though, fortunately, without injury to the crew. When the vessel reached 35 north and 47 west, the gales swung in from eastward, and she was hard jammed in the wind to 34 south. Easting was made in 44th parallel, variables and bitter cold rainy weather continuing throughout. On 1st inst., the Leewin was passed, and after a westerly gale, E. to north-easterly light winds and fine weather set in near Port Philip Heads were reached, on Wednesday night.
