Mr. John Gormley has left for Pictou, where he will be an employee of the firm of Fred MacGee Limited.

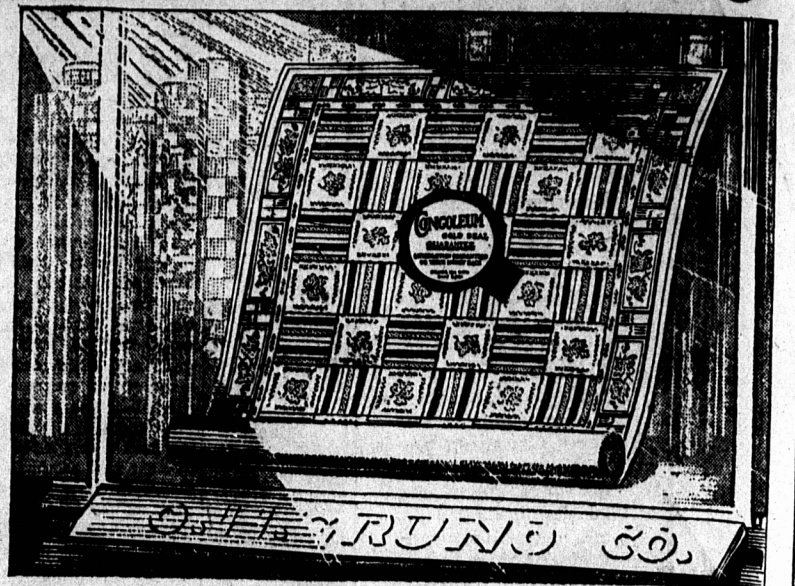
Mrs. Howard McKenzie has left for Pictou also an employee of Mr. MacGee.
