News Budget of Happenings Round About the District.

MR. W. M. FERGUSON left by the Halifax yesterday to resume his studies at Cornell.

MR. F. L. HASZARD and Mrs. Haszard left yesterday morning for Montreal and Boston.

PROHIBITION rally at New Haven Hall, on Friday evening, 23rd inst, at 8 o'clock. Rev. Messrs Brown and Dawson and other speakers to address the meeting.

His friends will be pleased to learn that Mr. John McEachern, who was severely struck on the side of the head yesterday by the shaft of a passing sloop, is not considered seriously injured and rested well last night.

It has been announced that Rev. W. H. Warren will deliver a lecture in the Baptist House of Worship at Central Bedouco, on Tuesday evening, the 27th inst., in which he will give some account of his recent tour in England and Scotland, illustrating his descriptions by specially selected views projected by a fine new lime-light stereopticon.

TEACHERS ASSOCIATION.—The annual meeting of the P. E. I. Teachers Association will be held in Charlottetown on Thursday and Friday Oct 6th and 7th. This meeting promises to be of more than ordinary interest as G. M. Hay of St John Dr. Hall of the Truro Normal School and W. A. Hickman of Picton are expected to be present and take part in the proceedings. The executive are to be congratulated on having secured the services of these eminent educationists and the teachers of the province should show their appreciation by attending in large numbers.

THE Toronto Globe in a special Saturday edition devotes about two pages to a review of temperance reform in Canada. The Globe also publishes a number of portraits of Canada's most prominent temperance workers. Among the portraits are those of Hon. David Laird, Vice-president, Dominion Alliance; Conncillor Horne, Charlottetown President Provincial Alliance; Mr J. D. Seaman, Charlottetown, President, Charlottetown Alliance; Rev. Joseph McLeod, Fredericton, Mr. W. W. Buchanan, Hamilton; Rev. Geo. W. Fisher, St. John; Hon. Sydney Fisher, who introduced the plebiscite bill in the House of Commons and others not so well-known in this province.

Mr Charles Graham, of Tallahassee, Fla. is visiting his sister at Georgetown. Mr. Graham was a member of Roosevelt's Rough Riders and took part in the now famous battle of Santiago. He was one of the men who was with Capt. Capron when that gentleman was killed in ambush. Mr Graham has a number of interesting relics of the war. Asked as to the condition of the troops he said they were wretchedly provided for while in Cuba. The company of which he was a member fared better than the rest of the troops as the officers on several occasions purchased food for the men out of their own pockets. The general condition of the army was, he said appalling, as they had little food, less clothing, and drugs or medicines were almost unknown. At Santiago Mr Graham was twice wounded, being shot once in the wrist and once in the side. His wounds however were not serious.

Second prizes, New Brunswick, 12; Prince Edward Island, 3; Quebec, 1. Third prizes, New Brunswick, 6; and Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia and Quebec 1 each. The display of cattle is fine. There are between 400 and 450 animals on the ground, and of these the dairy breeds largely predominate over beef cattle. Of the latter the Polled Angus are all from Quebec Province, the Galloways and Guernseys all from Prince Edward Island, and the Devons all from Nova Scotia. The prizes, taken by province, were: Beef breed: New Brunswick, 1st, five; 2nd, six; 3rd three, Nova Scotia, 1st, sixteen; 2nd, fifteen, 3d, five. Prince Edward Island, 1st, eleven; 2nd, five; 3rd three, Quebec, 1st, fifteen; 2nd, three; 3rd, four.

In dairy breeds, the prizes fell thus by provinces: New Brunswick, 1st, fifteen; 2, seventeen; 3rd, twenty; Nova Scotia, 1st, seventeen; 2nd, twelve; 3rd, eleven, Prince Edward Island, 1st, eleven; 2nd, one; 3rd, three; Quebec, 1st, seventeen; 2, ten; 3rd, two.

The prizes for grade cattle, were thus distributed: New Brunswick, 1st, five; 2nd two; 3rd, four. Nova Scotia, 1st, nine; 2nd, eleven; 3rd, five; Prince Edward Island, 1st, one; 2nd, two; 3rd, three.
