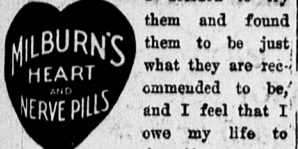

THE SURGICAL TREATMENT OF CANCER

Surgery is the most scientific branch of medicine, and in no direction is surgery capable of greater accomplishments than in cancer. Standard procedures exist for the surgical treatment of cancer in nearly every part of the body. The operative technique employed by one surgeon is practically identical with the procedure used by another.

There is no secrecy about the surgery of cancer. Nobody has a proprietary method or an exclusive instrument. What is done by one surgeon or at a given clinic is known to all. Through meetings of their great associations, by means of their profusely illustrated journals and by visits of investigation and study the surgeons of one country are made familiar with the work done elsewhere. All over the United States, as in Europe, skillful surgeons are available to perform what would have been regarded a hundred years ago as miracles.

Surgery is the main weapon with which civilization is seeking to combat cancer. It is used as a preventive and cure. It is employed as a

preventive when it removes precancerous conditions and as a curative when it eliminates the cancer itself. Not uncommonly radium and X-rays are employed in connection with surgery.

It is a relic of barbarous times when unreasoning fear is allowed to prevent a patient from getting the benefit of surgical treatment. It is reminiscent of the days before anaesthetics were employed, before aseptic operations were performed.

Surely the triumphs of which so many brilliant examples were afforded by the great war should teach the public that surgery is one of the most beneficent resources of modern times.

A. Cape Breton was annexed to Nova Scotia in 1763. It was separated politically from Nova Scotia in 1784, and the island was ruled by a Governor and Council until 1820, when it was re-annexed to Nova Scotia, in spite of local petitions to the contrary at the time.

Trade Depression Hits Football Clubs

LONDON, Dec. 5. — Trade depression has seriously "hit" several League football clubs in the North and in Scotland, and in more than one quarter financial crisis faces the directors. Durham City, the League III. Northern League Club, were helped out of their difficulties by the higher owners, and so enabled to fulfil an out-of-town engagement. There has since been a consultation with the Football League, and the club is to make a big effort to carry on.

A sensation has been caused in Scottish football circles by the announcement that the Clydebank Club, members of the Second Division of the Scottish League, has sold its ground to greyhound racing syndicate. The acute state of Clydebank's finances may be realised by the fact that the gate of their game recently played amounted to only £35. Following the game a delegation of London and Glasgow business men went over the pitch, and the deal was completed later for the sale of the ground at £12,000. Alterations will be made immediately so that racing may commence in the New Year.

LOCAL INDUSTRIES

Sir,—It's all very well for the Hon. Mr. Inman to talk grandiloquently about the establishment of local industries. But when free entrance is given to the products of the large established industries of all the other provinces and a comparatively low rate of duties is imposed upon the products of the highly protected industries of the United States, it is evidently difficult to maintain local industries in this small province. There are, some local industries the raw materials of which are drawn from the soil, which can be maintained here in spite of every handicap. Our cheese and butter factories have done well, and there are canning factories and other factories that ought to do well, if our merchants did not yield so easily to the blandishments of the travelling salesmen, so giving preference to outside industries over those of local industries the products of which are equally good and cheap.

AUSTRALIAN BUTTER

Sir,—Premier King, I notice, says that there are two sides to the question whether Australian and New Zealand butter shall be admitted into Canada free (or almost free) of duty. Yes, there are two sides: the Canadian farmer's side and the other side.

Evidently Mr. King leans to the latter. How the Canadian farmers will lean at the next election is another matter.

The Canadian farmers working hard, winter and summer, are now compelled to compete with outsiders on equal terms, while the Canadian manufacturer enjoys the considerable protection afforded by Customs duties ranging from 25 to 50 per cent. Yet the Canadian manufacturer gets his butter and cheese made where the cattle are out in the fields all the year round, on terms which the Canadian farmer who has to buy articles of trade made in outside countries is denied!

Why doesn't Premier King and his Party do the fair thing by Canadian Farmers? Why doesn't he clap on the imports of the manufacturers duties equal to those imposed upon the farmers exports to foreign countries. It seems to me shameful that our farmers should be treated so unfairly as they are.

EMIGRATION

Sir,—It was remarked by a good old Presbyterian Minister, who spoke at a closing meeting of the Prince Street Methodist School about forty years ago, that this Island is "as a beehive, and must necessarily send off a swarm every year." In recent years, too, there has been a great influx of farm and other machinery by which the labor of men and women on the farm has been greatly reduced. Then there has been in recent years the lure of the United States in which high wages have been paid to men and women able and willing to work—as all P. E. Islanders are. There has also been the lure of the West where broad acres ready for the plough were offered farmers at a minimum of cost.

On the other hand the larger and stronger industrial establishments of the mainland have supplied the people of this Island with machinery and other requirements at a little less cost than they could be manufactured or produced here—and merchants and people naturally bought in the cheapest markets, so compelling local industries to stop and their work people to emigrate. So that, all things considered, it is not wonderful that the tide of emigration is maintained.

Still there is no need to be downhearted. There are as good fish in the sea as ever were caught, and there are as good men and women here now, as those who have gone away. Our schools are full of children, and we have yet young men and women who marry and are given in marriage. Industry and pluck will maintain the prosperity of this Island Province in spite of the competition of outsiders, and the tide of population will rise again. We have advantages here that will all ways be counted by men and women of good judgment.
