Zion C.E. Society Annual Banquet

Besides the regular members, a number of friends who assisted in the past season's programmes, were present as specially invited guests.

The annual banquet does not mark the winding up of the Christian Endeavour year, but is held at this time in order that the student members may conveniently attend.

When the youthful throng had seated themselves around the groaning board, The Grace was chanted in unison, and after everyone had competently performed appropriate justice to the sumptuous repast, the singing of several favourite songs was heartily engaged in.

Honorary President, Rev. G. Carlyle Webster, was Toastmaster for the occasion, and after making a few introductory remarks, he proposed the toast to The King.

This was responded to by the singing of the British National Anthem, after which Hon. Pres. Webster proposed the toast to Canada.

In response to this, the full version of O Canada was rendered in chorus.

Vice President, George Art MacDougall then proposed the toast to The Church.

Mr. Donald MacKinnon, representing Zion Congregation, made an extensive response which was followed by the concerted rendition of the Christian Endeavour Rally Hymn.

life much was required of the housewife. Not only did she cook all that was eaten in the house, but went out and assisted her husband in the harvest fields. It was her job to spin and card the wool for their clothing, as well as to spin and weave the linen.

Mrs. Gaudet lost her husband about twenty-five years ago and has since lived a quiet uneventful life spending the evening of her days surrounded by her children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

Fined For Shipping Skins

SAINT JOHN, N. B., May 6.—Pleading guilty to a charge of attempting to ship 1,295 muskrat skins illegally from Saint John to Montreal and Quebec with intention of evading a royalty tax imposed by the Provincial Government on such shipments, H. L. Ross, of Saint John, was fined \$100 in the police court today.

The furs were seized at McAdam Junction earlier this week by H. H. Ritchie, chief game warden for the Province. He valued the shipment at \$900 to \$1,000, and royalty due the Government was \$50. Furs have been confiscated by the Government.

Temperature Of Water Has Effect On Herring Catch

(Special to the Guardian)

MONCTON, N. B., May 6.—In the Atlantic coast region between Saint John and Grand Manan as many herring are taken practically as in all the remaining Canadian Atlantic coastal waters, states a bulletin of the Natural Resources Department of the Canadian National Railways. It is known as the Passamaquoddy region and has as its centre the district of West Isles, which comprises Campbell, Deer and other islands, placed between the end St. Andrew's Bay and the Outer Bay, which, with the Wolves Islands as its centre, opens broadly into the Bay of Fundy.

The study of herring catches in this area conducted by the Biological Board of Canada reveals that temperature of water has a great effect on the extent of the catch, the herring becoming active during the warm weather of the summer months and sluggish or "loggy" during the winter season.

The fishing is carried on mostly by means of weir nets and these are most effective during the summer season when the herring are active and move into the nets. During the cold period the herring are sluggish and the catch is very much curtailed.

In experiments with bag nets these were more effective during the winter than in the summer, the bag nets being unsuitable during the summer season when the herring are active and the weir nets unsuitable during the winter season when the herring react to the cold water and become sluggish. The weir net works on the principle of waiting for the fish to swim into it.

The reaction of the herring to warm and cold water follows its nature as, unlike warm blooded animals, its body is just as warm or as cold as the water in which it lives and the life processes are accordingly rapid or slow.

Liquor Tax Buys Fuel For Jobless

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., May 6.—(C.P.)—Liquor consumers contributed \$9,535.95 toward providing fuel for needy families in St. John's during the winter months, according to the annual report of the Newfoundland Board of Liquor Control, tabled in the legislature. A stamp was affixed to each bottle of liquor sold during November, December and January, and the proceeds were ear marked for the purpose of buying fuel.

Prairie Sheep Herding

Herding sheep on the prairie range during the summer months is practised in different ways, each rancher having worked out methods to meet his own conditions. However, there are three broad classes, based on the night care of the flock. First, there are those who corral the sheep at night; second, those who have no corral but use the same bed ground each night; and third, the semi-nomadic system with a new bed ground every night.

Will Discuss Rail Order

SYDNEY, N. S., May 6.—Premier Gordon S. Harrington of Nova Scotia today informed Mayor S. E. Muggah he proposed taking up with the federal authorities the question of a 50,000 ton rail order for the Sydney steel plant. The Premier's telegram was in reply to a message sent by a committee that recently visited Ottawa to ask that the Government authorize issuance of the order by the Canadian National Railways.

Youth Long "Dead" Returns to Life

CALCUTTA, May 6.—An astonishing story of how a Hindu youth, who was bitten by a snake fourteen years ago, and whose body was thrown into the Ganges in the belief that he was dead, gave a dramatic surprise to his parents by suddenly reappearing at his home is reported from Mohalla Bhiknapahar, Patna.

It is stated that the boy, a son of Ramorup Cope, a milkman, was bitten by a snake in 1919. The father, believing that the boy, then aged twelve, was dead, did not cremate the body, as it was customary that the body of a person who died of snake bite should not be cremated, but threw the body into the Ganges. The body, it is now declared, was carried away by the current and eventually attracted the notice of a Bengali snake-charmer.

The Bengali, finding that the body was not altogether lifeless, picked it up and succeeded in bringing the boy back to life.
