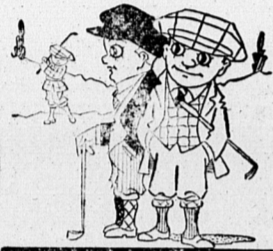

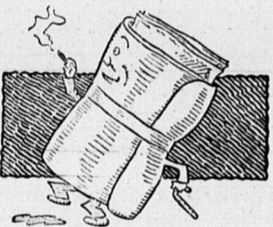

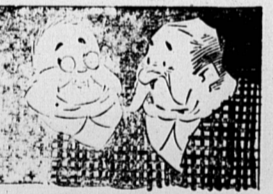

1930 Report Of City School Bd.

The following pupils were enrolled in the city schools for the year ending Dec. 31, 1930, according to the report of the Board of School Trustees submitted at the annual meeting of the City Council Thursday night:

Prince Street School, 146 boys, 362 girls, total 528.

West Kent School, 378 boys, 139 girls, total 517.

Queen Square School, 871 boys, Rochford Square School, 463 girls. Total number of pupils enrolled, 2,079.

The number of teachers employed is: Prince Street, 15; West Kent, 15; Queen Square, 15; Rochford Square, 13; Supernumerary, 2. Total, 60.

The amount paid as supplements to teachers' salaries for the year was \$23,899 less deductions for pension system of \$545, and the total expenditure on current account was \$48,435.47.

A prize of \$15 was awarded to Miss Erna Patterson of Prince Street School for making the highest marks in the city at entrance examinations to Prince of Wales College.

At the closing exercises in June the following were awarded the Governor General's Bronze Medal for general proficiency:

Prince Street School: Marjorie Fraser.

West Kent School: Horace McEwen.

Queen Square School: Louis Monaghan.

Rochford Square School: Stella Smith.

During the year \$4,000 of debentures were issued.

During the summer vacation the girls' lavatory at Prince Street School was equipped with new closets and tanks, the ceiling and walls replastered and painted and it is now in a first class condition.

The main halls of Prince Street and West Kent Schools were newly painted as well as some class rooms. Ten class rooms were painted in Queen Square School and two rooms in Rochford Square School.

During the year the new eight room annex to Rochford Square School was rented by the Board and five rooms were retained in the old school.

The grading of the grounds at West Kent School was completed during the early summer and has added much to the appearance and value of the school property. It will be necessary before long to have both lavatories in this school remodelled.

After a faithful service since May, 1891, Mr. R. B. Dewar tendered his resignation as janitor of West Kent School in August, and was succeeded by Mr. Fred Ward who is carrying out his duties in a most satisfactory manner.

Manual Training was carried on in the Agricultural Hall under the efficient supervision of Mr. Le Baron E. Tait.

In June Mr. Simon Paoli succeeded Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan as a Government appointee on the Board, and Mr. William Moran was succeeded by Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan as a City Council appointee.

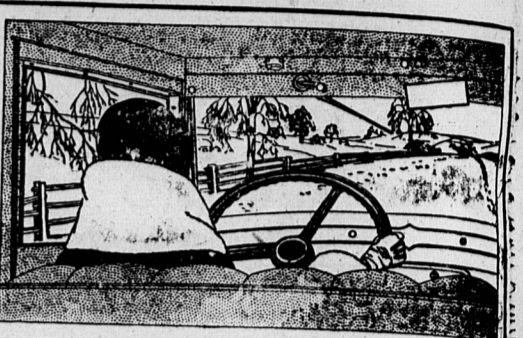
