There are two large paintings entitled "The Landing of the First Canadian Division at St. Nazaire," and "The Defence of the Suroit Wood." The window is tastefully decorated with flags and a large portrait of King Edward. There are also some old-fashioned guns, including a water-cooled machine gun which was captured from the Germans. Simpson's Ltd. will be closed Wednesday.

S. A. McDonald's Remembrance Day window is most awe-inspiring—crowds gathered all afternoon and paused in silence that brings them to a true remembrance of the Great War. The window represents Flanders Field with its many crosses in the centre of the miniature grave-yard is a great monument dated 1914-1918, with the names of the towns where our gallant Canadians fought and fell. LIBERTY'S CAPTAIN AND CREW RELEASED

Vessel held by R. C. M. P. Awaiting Instructions from Ottawa.

Captain and crew of the 50-foot motorboat which was taken by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police off the Magdalen Islands over the week-end were released in Charlottetown yesterday but their vessel was still being held by officials.

While awaiting word from headquarters in Ottawa, the Mounted Police kept the Liberty tied to the wharf alongside the patrol boat Alachasse.

The chase began last Wednesday when the preventive cutter spotted the motorvessel off North Point, P. E. I., and headed toward her. The Liberty sped away and the Mounties followed but could not overtake the powerful vessel.

Over the week-end, the Alachasse came up alongside the Liberty off the Magdalen Islands. The 50-foot craft was lying alongside a schooner at the time but headed away as the Alachasse approached.

The Mounted Police vessel fired eight shots at the Liberty, one of which ricocheted off the boat and struck the captain over the eye. He was bowled over by the shot but was treated by a doctor and was able to get about almost immediately.

The Liberty hove to after the shot had been fired and the Alachasse took her in tow to Charlottetown.

The Liberty was being held in Charlottetown on a charge of failing to stop when ordered to do so by a patrol boat, pending instructions from headquarters in Ottawa.

The 50-foot motorboat with three powerful engines, is registered in St. Pierre, Miquelon.

Captain Henry Ducos of St. Pierre was in command of the Liberty and she carried a crew of four besides the skipper. The crew comprised one from St. Pierre, a Canadian and two Americans.

Await Full Report
OTTAWA, Nov. 9—(CP)—What further action will be taken respecting the seizure of the motorboat Liberty off the coast of Prince Edward Island will depend on details not yet received here, Royal Canadian Mounted Police officials said tonight.

As soon as a full report was received from officers in Charlottetown, the question of disposal of the craft would be considered in conjunction with national revenue department officials.

Notice regarding the time of the auction sale will be placed on the order board at the Exhibition Building and announced during the period of the Show.

Peace—the need of it and the difficulty of securing it is a topic which is uppermost in the minds of many people in these troublous days. The C. G. I. T. Movement has a very definite responsibility in the development of its members of peace attitudes which are based on an intelligent understanding of the factors which make peace difficult or seemingly impossible and the need for group thought and action in any effort towards peace. For this reason the National Girls' Work Board calls upon its membership to observe a Dominion-wide Peace Week at the same time as Armistice Day reminds of the futility of war as a means of bringing peace. Approximately 40,000 members of this inter-denominational organization with their group leaders across Canada will carry out a suitable program for C. G. I. T. and Peace Week combined. C.G.I.T. groups are organized in Nfld. Japan China, Trinidad, India, Africa, and United States. In Canada many teen-age girls of different races carry out a similar program and unite in the same purpose. As a Canadian Girl in Training under the leadership of Jesus it is my purpose to—Cherish health; Seek Truth; Know God; Serve Others and thus with His help become the girl God would have me be.

The Canadian Girl in Training programme is based on the familiar lines from Luke 2: 52. "And Jesus increased in wisdom and stature and in favour with God and man". The programme aims to help girls grow in the same broad way as did the boy Jesus. Wherever possible an organized Sunday School class is the C. G. I. T. unit and the Sunday session contributes to the lives of the girls and leader what they themselves put into it in preparation, thought, and discussion. In the mid week meeting there are singing, games, a business and devotional period and an "Activity" time which include a very wide variety of projects. One of the year's projects is usually related to world friendship and Missions and the girls often perform services along this line for their own church. Hikes are popular for every season of the year. Handicraft is carried on in many groups. Scrapbook making picture framing, parties, are only a few of the many projects. The ideal is to help each girl to find abundant life in her home, school, church and community and looking beyond these immediate circles to the Nation and the world in which she lives. Camp is the highlight for most Canadian Girls in Training. Ten days spent in the out-of-doors with girls of the same age are filled with happy hours of hiking, swimming, playing, worship and Bible study in the out-of-doors and interest groups of all kinds on attractive subjects.

Particulars Of Accident Death Of Mrs. G. Coady

A New York newspaper to have contained an account of the accident on October 29th resulting in the death of Mrs. Gertrude Coady in hospital four hours later.

The report states that one woman was killed and a man critically injured yesterday when an automobile after collision with a trolley car crushed them against an iron railing at Metropolitan Ave. and Lorimer St., Brooklyn.

The victims were Mrs. Gertrude Coady, 38, of 101-13 109th Street, Ocean Park, and William Buchan's, 40, of 349 61st Street, Brooklyn. Both were taken to Greenpoint Hospital. Mrs. Coady with her right foot amputated and her left leg broken died yesterday afternoon, and Buchan is recovering from lacerations of both legs.

The two were among a group walking on a sidewalk near the entrance to the station of the B-M T 14th St. line when the automobile, and a Lorimer St. trolley collided at intersection.

The machine glanced off the trolley, shot over the curb and pinned Mrs. Coady and Buchan against the railing at the subway entrance.

Police of Herbert Street Station said Otto Schuller, of 6 Cypress St., Floral Park, Nassau was driver of the automobile, and Gaspar Samoles, of 457 Keop St., Brooklyn, motorman of the trolley.

James Coyle, Sr., has returned home from New York, where he was called on account of the accidental death of his sister, Mrs. Gertrude Coady, who was killed by an automobile which had collided with a trolley car, and crushed up over the sidewalk crushing her against the iron railing of the subway.

Mrs. Coady was rushed to the Greenpoint Hospital where she died four hours later, after receiving the last rites of the Catholic Church.

Her funeral was held on Saturday morning at 10 o'clock to St. Mary Gate of Heaven Church, where a solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated.

Burial was in St. John's cemetery. The Colonial Company of which she was assistant business manager, was closed on Saturday out of respect to her memory.

There were many beautiful floral tributes and Mass Cards received from her friends.

In Charlottetown this week the girls are planning different activities. On Sunday last they met in their own church and will in their mid-week session where discussions on Peace and programmes relating to it will be carried out.

Saturday, November 14th they meet for a Rally in Zion Presbyterian Church. The week closes with a Vesper service in the Baptist Church at four o'clock where Mrs. Denton, leader of one of the newly organized C. G. I. T. groups, will be in charge. This will close with a friendship circle where the girls will repeat together their purpose. All visitors are cordially invited to attend this service.
