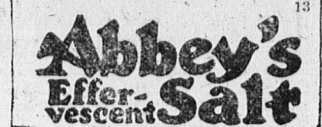
Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sale head of a family or any other person who has been a resident of a certain section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. 2 entries—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homesteaded land. Price \$5.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W. VIVID DESCRIPTION OF THE VIMY FIGHT

Mr. John McBride, Scotchfort, received the following letter from his son, Lance Corporal James McBride of the Princess Pats. France, April 14, 1917.

Dear Father and Mother:—You will no doubt be uneasy about me now that the Canadians have been in action again and of course every one will be thinking of their own. Well you need not worry about me, I came out all right thank God. I would not have missed it for quite a lot now that I am all right. It was a terrible day for the forgotten soldier. I hope I am spared that I may tell you all about it with my own lips. I will try and tell you as best I can now what it looked like to me. I had seen the battle of the Somme but it was nothing like this.

You can not imagine what it was like. I cannot describe it, but I will try. For days previous our guns had been shelling their position and the night previous to the attack was fine the moon and stars were shining bright. In the early hours of the morning the sky became overcast, the moon went down and left the night very dark. About this time a number of men crawled out over the top to cut our own wire so that we would have no trouble in getting out. By this time day light was coming on and the time was fast approaching when we must be going. The surprise is great. Many strange thoughts come in to a man's mind. The next few hours might be his last in this world and he thinks of home and the ones he loves. It is a few minutes before we were occupied by the enemy. There are quite a lot of dead, others are wounded, some have bolted and left their rifles behind them. We keep on as we must follow close on our own baggage. The enemy has taken to the open, his trenches are only a death trap, the rifle and machine gun fire is terrible and the ground is strewn with the enemy dead. The wounded are asking for help but we cannot stay. I look away on the right what a sight, the bursting of shells, the enemy's S. O. S., calls calling for his artillery, calling for reinforcements. What a sight, men shout and try to make themselves

heard above the din but it is impossible. Prisoners are passing back, their hands high above their heads they need no guard, they are only too glad to get out of it. We are temporarily held up by a machine gun, or a party of the enemy more brave than the rest. An officer waves his revolver, or points in the direction of the enemy, he starts to run, he is followed by his platoon or by the whole company. In a few minutes we pass over the obstruction, the garrison is dead or dying all brave men but they could not stand the mad rush of men flushed with victory. We reach our objective, we start to dig in and fix up some kind of a trench and prepare for a counter attack. We have got to hold it so many hours before we will be relieved. Well we held ours and the Canadians hold Vimy Ridge and our casualties are very small in comparison to the work done. We are having a rest now, doing nothing but eating and drinking, but I suppose we will soon be going at it again. I hope it will soon be all over and we will be on our way home. I think that I mentioned in some of my letters a fellow by the name of Jack Leslie, from Moresby Station, I am very sorry to say that he was killed with a few of the boys. I took him and gave him as decent a burial as I could on the field of battle. I will try and write to his dear mother whom he often spoke of to me. Well I think I will stop for this time as it is getting very dark now. Do not worry about me dear parents, I am all right and hope to be with you all soon. Your son, JAMES.

LIUT. BURGESS TELLS OF TAKING OF VIMY RIDGE. Former Charlottetown Gives Vivid Description of Great Deed of Canadians on April 9th. April 9th.—We have orders to move from our rest billets to Vimy Ridge and everybody knows what is before them. We are just behind the line and are waiting for darkness to move into the "jumping off" trench. At last, after what seems ages, the word is given to move off by platoons, and all the officers shake hands, for life is uncertain out here. By midnight everybody is ready and in place, and now comes the long period of waiting for the dawn. April 9th.—At last the first streaks of dawn appear in the east and we know that within a few minutes the guns which have been silent for a couple of hours, will break out with a crash which would make Thor, the thunder god, blush with envy. The scene is ghastly, and everyone's nerves are strained to breaking point. Will the Canadians take Vimy Ridge and hold it? Of course they will. Everybody is confident. We look at our watches and give the order to get ready. At last hell breaks loose, and with their comrades—the Nova Scotians with their comrades—from all over Canada on either flank, leap over the parapet with a yell. Two of our platoons have volunteered to play the bat-

starts to mass for a counter-attack, but we are on the ridge and he is on the level plain below. so our artillery gives him a little more scrap iron and he retires in disorder for he has not much fight left in him and takes up a position further back. Our guns start to move up and we consolidate our positions, and the night passes fairly quietly for us, for the enemy is busy moving his artillery back. By morning we find him over three miles away from his old front line which he has held for so long. We are not finished with him yet, but I can say no more at present or the censor will check up.
