"Enter, O my nephew with your white friends. We are eager to hear of your experiences and the deeds you have done. Enter!" He turned on his heel and walked before us, and those who had accompanied him fell into single file behind us. So we paraded through the village—or rather I should say town, for it contained many thousand people—until we reached a house in the center where burned the Tribal Council Fire and there ambassadors and distinguished guests were lodged.

The roy-an-ehs, chiefs and elders filed into it at our heels and arranged themselves around the fire in the center. Then squaws fetched in clay dishes of meats and vegetables of several kinds, as well as fruit, which they set down at intervals around the circle, and at a signal from Do-ne-ho-ga-weh everybody began to eat, each one dipping his fingers into whichever dish was nearest or most to his liking, but all governed by the utmost deference toward the wishes of their neighbors.

At the conclusion of the meal Do-ne-ho-ga-weh lighted a ceremonial pipe, carved of soapstone, with a long wooden mouthpiece decorated with beads and small, bright-colored feathers. He blew one puff toward the sky and one toward each of the four quarters. Then he passed it to Ta-wan-ne-ars on his right hand, and Ta-wan-ne-ars gravely puffed it for a moment, and handed it to me. I did likewise, and gave it to Corlaer, who handed it on to the next man, and so it went the rounds of the fire.

Largest Electrical Plant In World

MONTREAL, March 23.—In their plant at Chute a Caron, Quebec the Alcoa Power Company will soon have installed four of the largest water-wheel generators in the world. Each of these generators will be capable of producing 77,000 horsepower and thus the four will produce 308,000 horsepower, an amount greater than the combined developed water power of the Provinces of Alberta, Saskatchewan and New Brunswick.

This power will be used wholly for the reduction of aluminum ores to pure aluminum. The process is an electrolytic one and requires an immense amount of electric power. The great power developed by these generators may be imagined more easily when it is understood that just one of these generators will develop enough power to light the whole City of Toronto and have enough left over to light Three Rivers. Or again, one of these generators would provide enough power to run all the washing machines in Canada or all the vacuum cleaners.

One feature of these generators is their compactness. The outside diameter of each is 31 feet and their overall height is 32 feet. In comparison with other large generators this is extremely low. The total weight of each generator is approximately 1,200,000 lbs.

Sons of P. E. I. In Ontario

It may be news to your readers that two of three young men applying on March 3rd, to be received as candidates for the ministry in the Presbytery of Glengarry, Ont., are sons of P. E. I. ministers, one of whom, John Calvin MacPhee is a native of Belfast, where his father, the late Rev. S. D. MacPhee was minister and where his mortal remains are at rest—Mr. MacPhee died at Avonmore Ont., where his widow and son reside. The other candidate, James Ewen Lamont is a son of a well-known minister, Rev. D. M. Lamont, a former minister of People's Church, Canoe Cove, and sister churches, but at present minister of the Scotch congregation Dumfries, Presbytery where the Gaelic, the language of Eden is spoken at home and preached by Mr. Lamont. At present in the Glengarry Presbytery there are four ministers in active service who are natives of P. E. I. who relatives and friends living here, are interested in their welfare. Besides Lamont of Dumfries, there is venerable clerk of Presbytery, Rev. P. A. MacLeod, M. A., D. Minister of St. Andrew's Church, Maxville. Dr. MacLeod, better known to his acquaintances as Peter Allen is a native of Dundas, Kin Co. P. E. I.

Last May there was inducted into St. Andrew's Church Lancaster another P. E. I. son, Rev. Louis H. Fowler B. A. son of Louis Fowler formerly of Ross Corner Bedouque P. E. I. A few years ago the family moved to Calgary where Mr. Fowler, Sr. resides at present. The son, Rev. Louis H. is a promising young minister in the Presbyterian Church.

Rev. M. J. MacPherson, M. A., B. D. a native of Ulster, P. E. I. is minister of Woodlands, Ont. They are all preaching the glorious gospel, laboring under the blue banner of the Presbyterian Church. Messrs McCallum formerly of Picotou Co. and MacPherson are the elected Commissioners to the General Assembly which meets in Toronto early in June.—M. J.
