## NEWSY FARM NOTES

By Agricola

### NATURE NOTES OCT. 1930

The first half of the month was generally fine, with clear skies. Sunday 5th, however, was signalized by a wind which rose at times to 45 m. p. h., and did some damage. Trees were blown down in the city. Sunday, 12th, was the reverse, a wonderful summer like day with the thermometer up to 76 deg. F. First hail here on the 20th, and from the 25th to the end of the month the weather was "broken." The 26th and the 30th were notable for heavy rainfall, the amount falling on the two days together being in excess of the rainfall of any month from May onward.

Two more "schools" of Blackfish (Globecephalus melas) were reported from Summerside on Oct. 5th. A classification of the Cleaceae or whales was published in these notes in the early summer.

Our local list of wild plants has been extended during the past season by the researches of Prof. R. R. Hurst and Mr. H. Messervey, and these gentlemen have kindly given me the names and localities of their findings. It may be of interest to know that Prof. Hurst's plants were mostly from the environs of the city, thus showing that no extensive journeys are required to enable the student of botany to contribute new plants to our flora. Mr. Messervey finds the northern parts of the Island have a rarer flora, but the exact localities are withheld in an effort to preserve such plants.

The following are the additions from all sources. The figures in brackets are the pages of Gray's Manual, seventh edition, on which descriptions will be found.

- Small Crab-Grass, Digitaria humifusa Pers. A garden pest (B. H. 95.)
- Dwarf Meadow Grass, Puccinellia pauperula. (R. R. Hurst.)
- Canary Grass, Phalaris Canadensis L. (Bain: 121.)
- Wood Reed-grass, Cinna latifolia. (Trev.) Griseb? (Bain: 137.)
- Brach Grass, Sand Reed, Marram, Ammophila arenaria. (L.) Link. (Bain: 136.)
- Marsh Grass, Spartina patens. (Ait.) Muhl. var. Juncea. (Mich.) Hitchc (Bain: 143.)
- Other Spartinas are likely to be found in our region.
- Poor Meadow Grass, Glycine nervata (Willd.) Trin (Bain: 159.)
- Meadow or Tall Fescue, Festuca elatior L. (Bain: 162.)
- The Poa aquatica of Bain is not to be found in Gray nor Britton's manuals. Perhaps P. triflora, a grass of wet meadows, found on P. E. I. by Prof. Groh in 1926.
- Crawford's Sedge, Carex Crawfordii. Fernald. (R. R. Hurst: 218.)
- Bald Rush, Juncus balticus Willd. (R. R. Hurst: 272.)
- American Bur-reed, Sparganium Americanum Nutt. (R. R. Hurst: 69.)
- Clasping-leaved Twisted-stalk, Strep topus amplexifolius (L.) D. C. (H. Messervey: 292.)
- Early Coral-root, Corallorrhiza trifida Chatelain (H. Messervey: 317.)
- Andrew's Orchis, Habenaria Andrewsii White (H. Messervey: 311.)
- This is a hybrid between two local species, H. Laccera and phycodes.
- Halbert-leaved Orache, Atriplex natula L. var. hastata (L.) Gray (B. H.: 368.)
- Horned Bladderwort, Utricularia cornuta Michx. (H. Messervey: 738.)
- Tuberous Bugleweed, Lycopus uniflorus Michx. (B. H.: 709.)
- Two species of Club moss turned out to be Lyopodium Clavatum L. and L. complanatum L. var. labeiforme Fernald, the latter known as Ground Pine.
- Mr. Messervey also gives a new locality for Poison Ivy, viz., near the railway track at Bumbury.

The great storm of the 26th drove many seabirds inland, and gave me an opportunity of examining one which I had not previously seen. It was the dovekie or sea dove, a small plump bird which may be best described as a little auk. It was so exhausted that it did not resist capture, and in spite of all care it died in the night. Its winter plumage which was fully developed, was sufficiently striking, the under parts, throat, and a ring round the nape being of a glossy white, and there was a white spot on each eyelid. The upper parts, the crown of the head, and the beak were what might be called Indian-ink black, excepting the tips of the secondaries and one edge

of the scapulars which were white. Like the auks these birds have no hind toe, and so are constrained to walk and sit on the whole leg from the "knee" downwards; and this makes their progression on land extremely awkward. Their feet are however well adapted for swimming hence they usually keep far out at sea. Their summer nesting grounds are on islands in the Arctic ocean and they come southward only in the winter; consequently we never see them in their summer plumage, whose chief difference is a blackish brown throat and breast, rather reminiscent of a robin. Reports from other sources would show that this storm destroyed a large number of these birds.

A friend who is fond of shooting informs me that he has shot doves for the table, and that the flesh is dark and resembles in flavor that of the pigeon, this is perhaps the reason it is called the sea dove.

As I write, at the end of October, the garden is still brightened by the flowers of the Scotch Marigold (Calendula) the annual Candytuft, and "Queen Anne's Thimble," a species of Gilia. These are highly desirable annuals from their long season of bloom.

The perennials ceased blooming about the beginning of the month; their flower stalks are now trimmed off and all made snug for winter.
