Meeting Of Maritime Tuberculosis Educational Committee

A meeting of the Maritime Tuberculosis Educational Committee was held in the Board of Trade rooms yesterday, with Dr. R. E. Wodehouse in the chair. The Chairman gave a report of the past six months activities and outlined the programme for the next year.

There were present representatives from the Provincial Government of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and the Red Cross Society of Prince Edward Island.

Dr. Creelman the new Health Officer and chest diagnostician of Prince Edward Island, Dr. Jabez Elliott, President of the Canadian Tuberculosis Association, representatives of the Halifax Tuberculosis Association and of the Nova Scotia Tuberculosis Commission, the Honourable Dr. Refus, Dr. Reid, of the Confederation Life Insurance Company and Deputy Mayor MacArthur of the Mutual Life Assurance Company, the last two having the interest of the Health Committee of the Canadian Life Assurance Company who are the donors of the annual gift of twenty thousand dollars which carries on the work of the Maritime Tuberculosis Educational Committee.

Miss McCourt, liaison officer of the Moncton Tuberculosis Association was also present.

In addition to the Chairman's report, reports were also presented covering the separate activities of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. The programme for the ensuing year was also tabled.

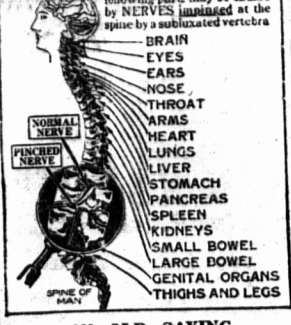

called attention to the excellent position of the Protective Association, financially and otherwise.

The object of the association is to defend its members from unjust, harassing, frivolous actions of mal-practice brought against them. Since 1901 a great many over 100 cases have been handled by the executive and their general Counsel, Mr. F. H. Chrysler, K. C. of Ottawa. In all these cases, save one, success has been obtained in the courts when such case came to trial, but in a much larger number of cases, a greater success was achieved by the withdrawal of a very large number before they even prepared for trial.

The president's report yesterday dealt largely with a suggested alteration of the by-laws in detail, which will have to be submitted to the Governor in Council and ratified, before they can be brought into force in January, 1929.

Before the meeting closed, Mr. Chrysler's report was read, dealing with the legal position of some as yet unsettled cases.

The financial statement for the year was also read. It showed a membership throughout Canada of 2170 members, approximately. The assets have now amounted to a satisfactory sum, which will provide sufficient ammunition to continue the good work on behalf of attacked members.

At the close of the meeting, the officers were all re-elected, namely: Dr. R. W. Powell, Ottawa, President; Dr. H. S. Birkett, Montreal, Vice President; Dr. J. F. Argue, Ottawa, Secretary Treasurer; Dr. J. D. Courtenay, and Dr. S. H. McElroy, both of Ottawa, additional members of the Executive and Mr. H. Chrysler, K. C., General Counsel.

The provincial executives from each province in the Dominion were also re-elected, and a plea was made by the president for increased interest by all the present members to enlarge the total membership to at least double its present size.

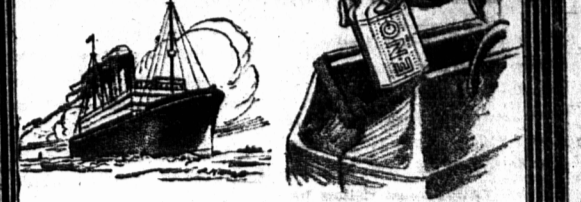

Executive Meeting Of P. E. I. Teachers Federation

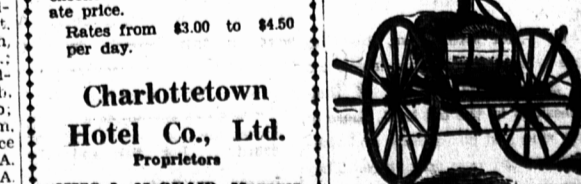
The monthly meeting of the Executive of the Prince Edward Island Teachers' Federation was held on Saturday, June 16th in Charlottetown.

The dates of the Fall Local Conventions were definitely decided upon. The programmes for each convention were arranged after discussion on the subjects to be presented thereat. School Fair work was also discussed both as to value of results obtained, and to best methods of conducting School Fairs so as to keep up an active public interest. A letter from the Womens International League for Peace and Freedom was read requesting the support of the teaching profession of the province.

The Executive expressed itself in favour of the resolution presented, but the signing of the resolution is to be left to the Island delegates to the Canadian Teachers' Federation Convention at Winnipeg next month.

The matter of membership in the Federation was then taken up, and the Registration report showed a very high percentage of the teaching body. It was urged that 100 per cent of registration in the Federation was necessary as the Executive must have the active and financial support of the whole profession in order to present the demands to the government and general public. The few remaining teachers who are not members are to be registered at the Fall Convention.
