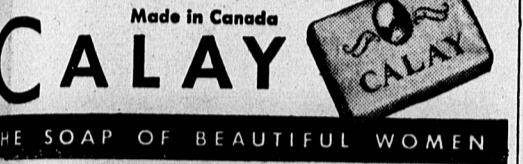

IN MEMORIAM MR. J. A. KELLY

Citizens learned with regret of the passing yesterday of Joseph A. Kelly, for the past seventeen years the painstaking and efficient C. N. R. Freight Agent in this city.

The late Mr. Kelly was of a most genial disposition and by his obliging manner made a host of friends, particularly among the business men with whom he came in contact daily.

Only last August he was called upon to bear the loss of a devoted and loving wife, together with his little boy Frank, who will now mourn the loss of both kind and indulgent parents.

Born in Charlottetown, Feb. 10th, 1873, the late Joseph Kelly attended Queen Square School, and later St. Dunstan's University. At the completion of his college term he entered the employ of the C. N. R. in Sept. 1890 as messenger at Charlottetown.

During leisure time he studied telegraphy and became so proficient that he was appointed station agent at Royalty Junction in Sept., 1893.

After serving with satisfaction to the railway and patrons alike at different stations he was appointed freight agent at Charlottetown on Oct. 9th, 1913, a position which he held until his demise.

He was a prominent member of the Knights of Columbus, and C. M. B. A. in both of which societies he manifested great interest.

Besides his young son he leaves to mourn, three sisters, Mrs. John M. Hughes, Mrs. P. W. Clarkin, and Mrs. F. J. Foley, all of this city; also two brothers, His Excellency Bishop Kelly, of Tulsa, Oklahoma, and Ambrose of Spokane, Wash., to all of whom the Guardian extends sincere sympathy.

FERRY AGAIN DELAYED—Owing to continued heavy ice in the Strait the car ferry was delayed again last night, the Borden train not arriving in Charlottetown until 8 o'clock. About 25 passengers made the crossing.

B. I. S. PARADE—A special meeting of the B. I. S. was held in their hall on Thursday night at which final arrangements were completed for the St. Patrick's Day Celebration. It was decided to have both the Canadian Legion and League of the Cross Bands take part in the parade, the procedure will be announced later.

ADDRESSES ST. ZITA CLUB—About 40 or 50 members of the St. Zita Club which is sponsored by the Catholic Women's League, listened with interest to a very instructive lecture by Dr. J. D. MacGulgan in the Knights of Columbus Hall last evening. The subject was "Contagious Diseases" and the Doctor outlined the causes and prevention of these diseases. Rev. Monsignor MacDonald presided at the meeting and introduced the speaker. At the conclusion of the lecture, a vote of thanks was moved by Miss Margaret Gallant, seconded by Miss Rose Blaquiere, and presented to the speaker by the President of the Club, Cicely LeClair. Mrs. F. J. Casey, President of the C. W. L., also tendered thanks to the speaker for his instructive address. The meeting adjourned with the singing of the National Anthem.

Provincial Legislature, March 10. The House met at 4:20 p. m. Answers to the following questions were tabled by the Premier:

20.—Mr. T. A. Campbell: (1) What are the names of the present Magistrates for Prince Edward Island? (2) What are the dates of their appointment? (3) What is the remuneration of each? What was the salary of the previous Magistrates for the whole Province? (4) On whose recommendation was each appointed? Answer: (1) Donald MacKinnon, K. C., Charlottetown; Arthur P. McQuaid, K. C., Souris; George M. Matthews, O'Leary. (2) As from 15th. December, 1931. (3)—a—\$650 per annum; b—Paid by Prohibition Commission. (4) Lieutenant Governor in Council.

Provincial Police Mr. T. A. Campbell: (1) What are the names, addresses and occupations of all persons appointed by the present Government to the Provincial Police as Prohibition Inspectors? (2) Were all such appointees Canadian Citizens at the time of their appointment? If not, which ones were not? (3) Were any or all such appointments recommended by the Commissioner of Provincial Police and the Prohibition Commission, or either of them? Answer: (1) See 29 (1) a. (2) All Provincial Police are Canadian citizens. (3) Appointed by Lieutenant Governor in Council.

Domiciled Companies 47.—Mr. Lea: (1) How many companies have been registered under the provisions of Domiciled Companies Act? (2) What revenue has been derived from the taxation of such companies since the passing of the Act? Answer: (1) 67. (2) \$34,600.

Lights On Vehicles 40.—Mr. T. A. Campbell: (1) Has the Government received any recommendations that all vehicles travelling on the highways at night should carry lights or reflectors? (2) Or with regard to the use of side-hitch on sleighs? (3) If so, what action does the Government propose to take on such recommendations? Answer: (1) Yes, by Grand Jury. (2) No. (3) No decision.

Subsidy Claims (32) Mr. LePage: 1. What steps has the present Government taken to press the Claims of the Province for additional subsidy against the Dominion and in particular with reference to the further implementation of the Duncan Report? 2. Table all correspondence between the Dominion Government and the present Provincial Government with reference to the said Claims. Answer: (1) None. (2) Answered by No. 1.

Road Gravel (10) Mr. McIntyre: (1) Give number of tons of gravel placed on highway from September to end of year. (2) Has gravel all been purchased in the Province. (3) Have gravel pits been purchased by the Government? If so, from whom? Give acreage of each pit, and price paid. (4) What was cost price per ton spread on highway? (5) Give different places gravel was placed. Answer: (1) Estimated quantity of gravel placed on road between September 1 and December 31, 54,721 tons. Supplied to Kensington and Souris, 1,261 tons. Total 55,982 tons. (2) All the gravel, with the exception of 230 tons came from Island pits and beaches. (3) The following gravel pits were purchased:

Eastgate Humphrey, Springton, 1/2 acre, \$500.00. Alfred Parsons, Millvale, 1/4 acre \$125.00. John J. Trainor, St. Anne, 1/4 acre \$125.00. Alex. McDonald, Goff's Bridge, 1/2 acre, \$500.00. Leslie McLean, Birch Hill, 1/2 acre \$650.00. (4) The average cost of placing the gravel on the highway was \$1.20 per ton.

Other Questions Hon. Mr. Stewart stated that questions relating to the Prohibition Act had been referred to the Prohibition Commission and the answers would be tabled when received.

Mr. T. A. Campbell said the answers to Question 30 were incomplete. He had asked whether dismissals of members of the Provincial Police were recommended by the Commissioner of Police and whether they had been approved by the Prohibition Commission. The answer was "Not necessary." He understood there was a standing order-in-council that appointments and dismissals of Provincial Police officers were to be made by the Commissioner of Provincial Police with the approval of the Prohibition Commission.

Hon. Mr. Stewart replied that the order-in-council referred to had been rescinded. The Commissioner of Provincial Police was not consulted. The Prohibition Commissioners approved of the changes made.

Budget Speech In reply to a question by Mr. W. M. Lea, leader of the Opposition, the Premier stated that he expected to deliver the Budget speech on Monday night next.

DEBENTURE ISSUE BILL On motion of Hon. Mr. Stewart the House went into committee, with Mr. Heath Strong in the chair to resume second reading of an Act to provide for the issue of debentures to pay off Bank overdraft and to raise funds to rebuild public buildings.

Mr. J. P. McIntyre repeated his objection, urged when the bill was in committee on Wednesday, that it was unwise to give power to borrow to the extent of \$2,000,000 for the purposes specified. He accordingly moved as an amendment that the "two" be struck out and that "one and one-half" be inserted in lieu thereof.

Hon. Mr. Stewart said he had nothing further to add to the explanation he had already given.

Mr. W. H. Denn's said the Opposition wished to co-operate in every way but he would urge that the Government try and make the amount as small as possible. The people, he thought would understand that an additional \$2,000,000 debt was being incurred.

Hon. Dr. MacMillan said he had too much respect for the intelligence of the people to believe that they would arrive at any such misunderstanding. He scored Mr. McIntyre's proposal, pointing out that the bank overdraft was over \$1,000,000 and that it was impossible to tell how much the rebuilding of Prince of Wales College and Falconwood Hospital would cost. He could not see the object of Mr. McIntyre's objection. The case was not parallel with his, Mr. McIntyre's, borrowing for road gravelling experiments. The present Government is borrowing for absolutely necessary purposes.

Mr. W. M. Lea said he knew that the Province had increased its borrowings very heavily in "the last four or eight years". The Opposition merely wished to suggest that the Government go along for a year with as little borrowing as possible.

Hon. Mr. Stewart said he believed in the sincerity of the Opposition leader's attitude but he could not say the same for Mr. McIntyre, because he, Mr. McIntyre, had admitted he was opposing the amount because the Conservatives had previously cut down his borrowings for road gravelling purposes. The present prospects look good for the issuing of provincial bonds. The Government did not contemplate borrowing more than was necessary for the purposes required. Nevertheless, it was well to be prepared for emergency. If the overdraft were left at the bank and financial conditions got worse,

Mr. LePage moved to reduce the borrowing term from thirty to twenty years.

Hon. Mr. Stewart said it was the practice in the Statutes to give thirty years but in exercising its authority the Government was expected to use common sense.

Mr. LePage's amendment was defeated and the clause carried on the same straight party division.

After discussion of other clauses, progress was reported and the committee asked leave to sit again.

On motion of Mr. Strong the House went into committee, with Mr. W. A. Stewart in the chair, on second reading of an Act to amend an Act to incorporate the town of Kensington.

Mr. Strong explained the purpose of the bill, as outlined in the petition. It is desired to borrow \$1,250 at present required for payment on permanent street work and to have authority to borrow an additional sum of \$2,000 in order to take advantage of any further emergency.

The bill was agreed to without amendment.

Domiciled Companies' Act On motion of Hon. Mr. Stewart the House went into committee, with Mr. Heath Strong in the chair, on second reading of an Act to amend Chapter 1 of the Statutes of Prince Edward Island, 1931, respecting companies domiciled or having security registers in the Province.

Hon. Mr. Stewart explained that the Act respecting domiciled companies, had brought \$34,600 in revenue to the Province since it was passed last year, and 67 companies have so far registered under the Act.

The amendments provide for the following taxation rate: (a) For each domiciled company having a paid up capital of One hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) or less, the sum of Fifty dollars (\$50); (b) For each domiciled company

and the bank called in the overdraft, the Government would be in an embarrassing situation. These were things that must be considered. Mr. Lea said there was no Province in Canada with sounder credit than this Province at the present time, and the banks should be willing to take this into consideration.

Liberal Overdraft Hon. Mr. Sharp pointed out that nearly \$1,350,592 (the amount of the bank overdraft) had already been borrowed "by our friends opposite" and the larger proportion of the amount now sought to be borrowed was to take care of that overdraft. If the maximum amount were reduced to \$1,500,000 as suggested by Mr. McIntyre, it would only leave a couple of hundred thousand dollars, after paying the bank overdraft, to finance the rebuilding of the College and Falconwood Hospital.

Mr. McIntyre said he was not opposing the amount of \$2,000,000 in order to "retaliate."

Hon. Mr. Stewart: "That was your attitude yesterday. You have changed your ground."

Mr. T. A. Campbell suggested that in the Premier's calculation, the insurance money had not been taken into account. That would make a reduction of about \$250,000.

Hon. Mr. Stewart: "Are you taking into consideration the replacements which we have already made, which naturally have to be paid out of that insurance?"

Mr. Campbell: "I took it that the \$750,000—the estimate which the Premier gave yesterday—included the present replacements."

Hon. Mr. Stewart: "I did not give any estimate of the replacements."

Mr. Campbell contended that on the Premier's figuring \$1,850,000 was the maximum that would be required to pay bank overdraft and rebuild the College and Falconwood Hospital; nor would it be necessary, he argued, to pay all this amount in one year. A smaller overdraft could be carried, and for the probable amount required a borrowing of \$1,500,000 should be sufficient. He therefore supported Mr. McIntyre's amendment.

Hon. Mr. McPhee pointed out that Mr. Campbell had omitted one very important consideration. The Premier had not stated \$1,850,000 as the maximum amount required. There was also the possibility that the Government might have to meet an item of \$308,000 of demand loans to the public. If the people required this money and these loans were called in, the amount required by the Government, on Mr. Campbell's own figuring, would be \$2,108,000.

The Opposition amendment was put to the committee and was defeated on a straight party vote, 11-14. Mr. McIntyre and Mr. J. H. MacDonald paired.

2nd Amendment Defeated

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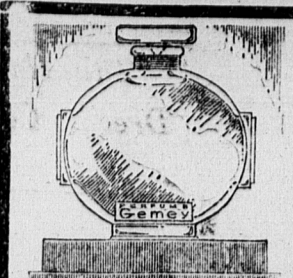

CHICAGO'S CRIME BILL IS \$6.65 PER CAPITA

CHICAGO, Ills., March 10.—It costs Chicago citizens an average of \$6.65 each a year for the city's fight against crime and criminals according to Municipal Judge John H. Lyle, nemesis of gangsters. The judge who waged the now famous "Campaign of embarrassment" against gangsters, said the total for 1931 was \$22,437,160. Included was \$19,244,249 for the Police Department, \$1,194,195 for penal institutions and \$578,844 for prosecution. In addition, Judge Lyle said, more than \$6,000,000 was lost by Chicagoans to robbers last year.
