SOCIETY WOMAN ARRESTED IN GAMBLING RAID.

NARRAGANSETT PIER, R. I., Aug. 12—Mrs. John Hanan, of New York and Narragansett Pier, who was present when a raid was made on the Narragansett Club Saturday night, and acknowledges it, received an ovation at the Casino when she made her appearance for the first time after the raid. She looks upon the whole matter largely as a joke, and her view of it is now generally accepted.

Mrs. Hanan said: "Certainly I was there, and I am glad I was. I wouldn't have missed it for anything. It was the funniest performance I ever saw. I don't wish to disparage the boy, John G. Gross, who made the raid. His intentions are good if he only worked where they need him, but we don't need reform of that sort here. The Narragansett Club is like any other well regulated club, like

that at Palm Beach and places where fashionable people assemble. When I have been there it has always been filled with little supper parties made up of the best people of the representative cottage colony here. "I had only been at the club ten minutes on Saturday night and was not playing the game at the time when I was arrested. I went over to the club from the Casino and a lot of others went along, too, some of these polo men and several women of the exclusive cottage colony from New York and Philadelphia. "When I was arrested I was asked to give the names of the others, but I said I did not recognize one of them and had never seen them before. The newspapers have said that I gave my name as 'Mary Jones,' but I didn't. I said I was 'Jane Doe.'"

VOICES ACROSS THE SEA.

A submarine telephone cable of a novel type was recently laid across the Channel from Dover to Cape Griznez by the British post office, says the Daily Graphic, in order to improve telephonic communication between England and France, and to determine the limits of possible improvement by the use of the new type—with a view to its application to telephonic communication between places which have hitherto been beyond telephonic range. This is the first cable of the kind laid in tidal waters and across the open sea, although a similar cable was previously laid in the Lake of Constance. The new cable will be brought into regular use as soon as the corresponding French lines are completed. The tests so far made have given very satisfactory results. The electrical conditions of submarine cables make telephonic communication through them difficult as compared with land lines, and any improve-

ment in their efficiency will obviously have a marked effect in extending the distance through which telephonic speech is possible. In the case of the new cable just laid, its efficiency has been increased more than three times beyond the value which it would have if it had not been specially treated. This improved efficiency is due to the insertion of "loading coils" in the cable at intervals of one knot. The French government propose to lay a second new cable across the Channel, and it will thus be possible to provide for the increased traffic likely to result from the reduction of charges for conversations between England and France which will then take effect. In the meantime, it is proposed to use the new British cable for experiments in conversation between London and Amsterdam, and possibly Berlin and other cities in Germany. Hitherto such conversation has been prevented by the difficulties involved in the use of submarine cables of great length, and the only continental country be-

sides France at present in telephonic communication with Great Britain is Belgium. There is, however, a large and real demand for telephonic communication of this kind with Holland and Germany.

CAMERA CAUGHT GAME.

Hunters of big game, in Africa and elsewhere, are sometimes reproved for what looks like a wanton waste of life, yet, in fact, no one is more interested in the preservation of all sorts of wild species than the true sportsman. According to C. G. Schillings and others, the wary hunter rather than the sportsman or naturalist is causing the gradual extinction of the elephant and the rhinoceros. On the other hand, Mr. Schillings can speak with real enthusiasm of a sportsman like Colonel

Roosevelt, though he himself prefers the camera to the rifle. "President Roosevelt," he writes in the preface to "In Wildest Africa," his latest book, "has always been one of the foremost pioneers in the movement for the preservation of nature in all its forms and has made every possible use of the resources placed at his disposal by his high position to further this end."

WOMAN KILLED IN BOSTON.

Boston, Mass., Aug. 14.—James Ferguson, of Moncton, a brother of Sandy Ferguson the pugilist, was arraigned in the Municipal Court charged with manslaughter in causing the death of Miss Jennie Vigneau who was knocked down by a wagon driven by Ferguson. She died in the hospital.

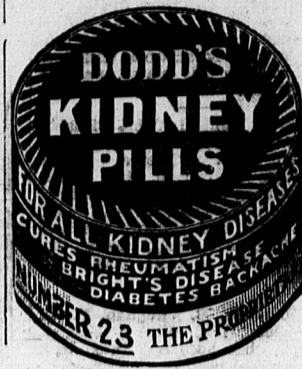
