SAVINGS BANK DEPOSITS.—According to a statement issued by the Finance Department at Ottawa, the deposits made in the Dominion Savings Bank in Charlottetown for January amounted to \$26,879, while the withdrawals for the same period totaled \$32,366.89, \$5,487.39 more having been taken out than was put in. At the 31st of December last, the total amount of the deposits in the bank was \$1,885,130.09, but after adding January's deposits and deducting its withdrawals, the total balance at the credit of depositors at the end of January was \$1,879,642.70.

CONCERT AT FALCONWOOD.—Last evening the inmates of Falconwood Hospital were entertained by a concert of solos, readings, quartets and other numbers, given by a number of people from the city. The concert was opened with the National song, O Canada, sung by Mr. Barlow and chorus. Miss Hughes contributed two solos to the program, as did Mr. G. E. Ritchie, Mr. Coeh and Mr. Hooper. Mr. A. Bruce also sang a solo. Miss Phillips gave two readings and Mr. W. McLeod one. Messrs. Bruce, Hooper, Ritchie and Robins formed a quartette and contributed twice to the enjoyment of the inmates. Mr. Barlow gave one of his unusually sweet whistling solos. The concert was closed with God Save the King and the Island Hymn. Prof. Watkis and Miss Katie Stanley were the accompanists.

BISHOP'S PALACE.—A representative of The Guardian yesterday visited the Bishop's Palace with a view to ascertaining what progress had been made in the carpentry work there. The entire interior of the building is undergoing a change, the floors being substantially constructed the ceiling in most of the rooms decorated with stucco work of a splendid artistic design. On the top flat there are six bed rooms, all of the same dimensions. On the flat below there is a large library, adjacent to which is a smoking room. There are two sets of rooms for the assistant clergy, each consisting of a bed room and a sitting room. On this flat there is situated the lavatory. The Bishop's Chapel is, as becomes it, the most elaborate portion of the house, and it will be unadorned all round with oak. The ceiling is magnificent. The Parish Priest's bedroom is on the opposite side to that of the Chapel. The Archbishop's room, with bathroom attached, is to be well fitted up, and next to it will be the reception room. The Bishop will have a suite of three rooms, consisting of a bedroom, office and parlor. There is to be an additional wing to the building, 53 x 33 in which will be bedrooms for visiting clergy. The kitchen will be in that added part of the building. A word of commendation is certainly due Mr. Welsh, under whose direction the work is being carried on. Mr. Welsh is a capable and energetic workman and the building will be finished as soon as possible.
