CAPACITY HOUSES GREET EXCELLENT PRESENTATION AT PRINCE EDWARD THEATRE.

PHIL EDWARDS IS BEATEN

BOSTON, Feb. 17.—Eddie Blake, wearing Boston Amateur Athletic colors, provided one of the biggest upsets of the current indoor track season here last night by beating Phil Edwards, New York University's great negro runner, by a yard in the 600 yards run.

Edwards, running for the Olympic Club of Hamilton, Ont., got off to a poor start in the seven man race. His long strides carried him past everybody but Blake, who fought him off with a desperate fury on the back stretch. Fred Veit, of New York, was just a few inches behind Edwards at the tape. Blake's time was 14 2-5 seconds.

Though pressed hard by R. A. Dalrymple of the B. A. A. Conger, the Illinois A. C.'s great miler, won the Hunter mile event in four minutes 22 1-5 seconds, retiring the famous trophy from competition.

Local cheese dealers continued to report a featureless market as seasonal quietude held the market. Easterns sold at 19 cents and westerns from 19 to 19 1-2 cents a pound. The extremely cold weather was responsible for the firmness of the local potato market, especially in New Brunswick. Prices remained unchanged at from \$1.70 to \$1.75 for New Brunswick's and \$1.70 for Quebec's per ninety here. Dressed poultry held unchanged with a fair demand.

THE MARKETS

OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 7.—There is a continued scarcity of egg supplies on Canadian egg markets today and the general tendency is firmer. Toronto.—Egg supplies here are still scarce and the market is firm although unchanged in prices. A car of United States fresh arrived here costing delivered about 42 cents. Dealers here are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs extra 45, firsts 42, pullet extras 38, second 36 delivered cases returned. Prices to retailers are extra 53, firsts 51, pullet extras 48, seconds 45. Montreal Five cars of United States and one car of storage arrived here today. The fresh eggs cost 42 1-2 to 43 delivered. One car of Prince Edward Island blues cost 56 3-4 delivered. The market is holding firm. Winnipeg. Severe cold weather has again caused light local receipts and only 106 cases were received during the week just past. Dealers quotations to country shippers for ungraded eggs remain unchanged at extra 42, firsts 40, seconds 32, delivered cases returned. Clancy, christened Frank and called "King," of the Ottawa Senators, is considered by many hockey critics to be the greatest active exponent of "the fastest of all sports"—better at the ice game than even the extraordinary Eddie Shore of the Boston Bruins. "King" Clancy is a truly great defense-man and, besides, he is one of the ablest scorers.

The New York Rangers and other powerful hockey combinations at various times have tried to buy Clancy from Ottawa, but not only has the latter club rejected such offers, but the "King" himself prefers to play for his native city, where he was cradled in the game at which

he has become a master. Efforts to purchase Clancy, Hec Kiltrea and one or two other Senatorial brilliants bring to light a rather gallant and edifying attitude on the part of the Ottawa club. It represents the smallest city in the National League and because of smaller population it attracts the smallest gates in that combination; yet the Senators' owners refuse to make profits by selling Ottawa stars, preferring to give their patrons the best possible in hockey lines.

And "King" Clancy, of course, is the major home attraction in Ottawa. His father was one of Canada's great all-around athletes; an

all-time marvel at football. Young Frank inherited much of his dad's athletic fire, and has added to it.

The "King" is now about thirty years old and is in his seventh season as a professional. "Mike" Rodden, noted National League referee, rates Clancy as a better hockey star than Shore. As Michael insists: "The King can do everything that Eddie can, and is not handicapped by temperament. Shore is the better showman and a truly great hockey star, but I believe Clancy shades him in steady all-round performance. If I had my choice, the Ottawa King would be my first pick for any current all-star hockey team."

How to Saw Tubing or Sheet Metal

ing and sheet metal are difficult to cut with a hacksaw, as the saw has a tendency to stick and break the teeth. If the shape of the sheet metal permits, clamp a piece of wood on each side of it and saw through both the wood and the metal. The wood stiffens the metal to prevent vibration and steadies the saw blade. When sawing tubing, dive a piece of wood tightly into the tube.

The Sense of Time and Distance

The life of a car will be longer and cost of upkeep will be lower, and the danger of accident will be less if the driver acquires a knowledge of the time required for the various parts to

function. To shift gears correctly, without straining the mechanism, depends on the drivers accuracy in judging car and engine speeds. A knowledge of the shortest distance in which the car is stopped with either one or both sets of brakes, and one dry, wet, hard and soft roads, is an accident-preventing ability worth acquiring. Knowledge of the short-turn which can be made will prevent damage to the car, or to another car. Knowing the lowest speed in high gear from which the car can be accelerated without strain or danger of stalling, will enable the driver to get out of the path of a car approaching from the side. All these points added together have an important bearing on car and passenger life.

Now that skirts are gored and circular, you can get your even hemline by wiring a piece of chalk to a yard stick and turned around against it. The chalk will mark your skirt length for you.

Dit Clapper, Boston assumed the lead among actual goal getters in the League by running his total up to 33 goals. Ralph Welland, center ice player is in a tie with Nels Stewart, robust Montreal centre, each having scored 31 goals. Stewart has forged further to the front among the point makers of the Canadian section, 12 assists added to his goals giving him a total of 43 points and a lead of five over blond Hec Kiltrea, flashy Ottawa left wing.

Point totals in the Canadian section are considerably lower than those prevailing in the high scoring American division, for Frankie

Boucher, nimble centre of the New York Rangers has compiled a total of 58 points, which gives him a commanding leadership over all other players in the League. Joe Lamb, the aggressive Ottawa centre, is third in his division as a point maker in addition to which he has spent 95 minutes with the penalty timers.
