**SCOTT ACT ENFORCEMENT.**

"The law hath not been dead though it hath slept." It is thus with the Scott Act, and though preparations are making for its retirement from the stage to give place to a more advanced prohibitory measure, we recognise that it has been a good law and is still capable of effecting great good in its later days. We are glad to notice renewed activity in several sections east and west to enforce the Scott Act. No law will enforce itself. And no better evidence can be given than our friends in the country districts will enforce the Prohibitory Law when they get it then by enforcing the Scott Act while they have it.

Some will say, "You will never drive the liquor traffic from the land." Unfortunately we can never hope to drive social vice, or dishonesty, or slander, or even the graver crimes wholly from our midst. But we will not on that account repeal the laws which prohibit those vices, misdemeanors and crimes. Such laws effect their chief good as educative and preventive measures, and an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure, alike in the physical and the moral world. It is the duty of all good citizens to make it easy to do right and hard to do wrong and to remove temptation from the weak as far as may be. Such is the aim and object and such is the result of the laws forbidding the liquor traffic when they are duly enforced.

Liberty is spreading. Francis Joseph Emperor of Austria has ordered the preparation of a measure granting universal suffrage to his subjects.

It was Senator McMullen, Liberal, instead of Senator McMillan, Conservative, as stated, whose opinions in regard to the Intercolonial were quoted in The Guardian's Toronto despatch yesterday morning.

The alarming news comes from China of the massacre of a number of American Catholic missionaries at Lien Chow. Four were killed, and Dr. Machleh, the head of the station, badly wounded. A church school, hospital and the residences of the missionaries were burned.

The New Bedford, Mass whalers who have down to recently enjoyed free fishing and free trading with the natives in and around the waters of Hudson's Bay have returned from their latest cruise with loud complaints of interference by the Canadian cruisers in those waters and want the Washington government to intervene in their behalf. They say they were pursued, fined and compelled to obey Canadian customs laws. They want to smuggle their goods into Canada, catch Canadian fish and smuggle them into the United States, as they had been doing hitherto without hindrance.

**A CONTEST IN THE THIRD DISTRICT.**

A convention of the Conservatives of the Third District of Queen's County held in this city yesterday afternoon unanimously nominated Editor Peter McCourt to again contest the seat for that District at the by-election to take place on the 22nd instant. At the general election in the contest between Hon. Mr. Cumiskey and Mr. McCourt the result of the voting was very close, but in a by-election, with the government very firmly seated the chances of a Cabinet Minister who is seeking re-election are usually better than at a general election, when the fate of the government may be in doubt.

This well-understood fact made a number of Conservatives doubt the expediency of contesting the coming by-election in the Third District at this time. The majority have decided otherwise, and in so deciding are undoubtedly within their legal rights. We venture to hope and trust that in the coming contest both candidates and their agents and supporters will make a determined effort to keep within the law as to corrupt practices. The law is fair to both parties. An election without bribe money or whiskey is cheaper and in every way preferable to one in which these corrupting agencies are employed.

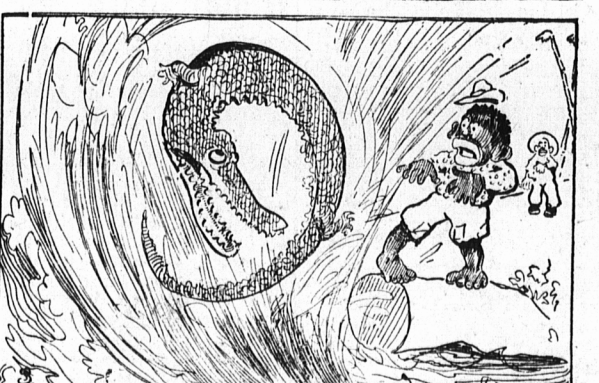
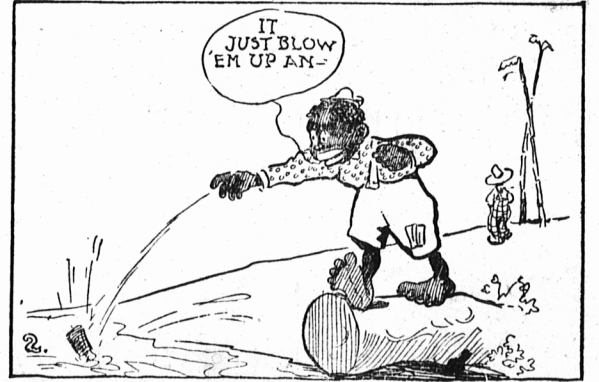
