The fair opened on Wednesday and the fisherman his nets and the business and professional men their offices and all met at the Fair grounds. There were thousands poured through the main gates and Thursday attendance record was made. Indeed the crowds were only little behind Wednesday's all time record, when an estimated more than 18,000 attended. Yesterday's program was as outstanding as the previous day. The 219 trot and pace and the 222 pace had large entry lists and proved almost as thrilling as the faster free for all. The vaudeville, including aerial acts, animal circus, song and dance numbers and the never to be forgotten bicycle act provided a most enjoyable and interesting interlude in the racing program.

Apart from the strenuous business of convention, there will be a pleasant interlude during which delegates will be driven to several changing points of interest in the vicinity of Charlottetown. Considering that the coming annual convention of the C. W. L. is being held in St. Dunstan's University, an ideal center on every point of view, delegates, members and visitors are looking forward with enthusiasm to this meeting which will serve as a time of refreshment and in the reviewing an impetus will be given for greater growth and greater progress.

Word was received in Ottawa that Captain W. W. Rogers, M. C., St. Martin's Island, was in command of the 7th Regiment Squadron of the Royal Canadian Air Force (Non-Permanent) which is to be established here. When the word came in St. John several months ago that the local garrison was to be augmented by a unit of the flying forces, considerable interest was evinced in both military and civilian circles as to who would command the local aviators. With a record that places his name in the rolls with Bishop, Collishaw, Barker and other Canadian war aces the St. John birdman's participation would provide a fine feat of achievement for the new organization, the contingent, Victor in the first successful encounter by an Allied airman with the vaunted German Gotha bomber during the world war. Captain Rogers won the Military Cross when he shot one of the giant planes down to earth in finding the one weak spot in its supposed invulnerability. Reposing in the collection of war trophies at the Byng Boys' Club, the black cross, distinctive markings of the big plane which had worried the Allies with its raids and its ability to down the smaller combat ships.

Captain Rogers was born in Alberton, Prince Edward Island, but has resided in St. John for a number of years. He has never taken particular interest in the local aircraft organizations. He is the son of Fred L. Rogers. When the World War broke out the captain was a faithful student at the University of Toronto and at the age of 18 he joined the Canadian Officers' Training Corps and later attended the Royal School of Artillery at Kingston. In 1916 he proceeded to England and was commissioned in the Royal Flying Corps and there qualified as a pilot. His first combatant appointment was to the No. 1 Scout Squadron, operating over Flanders. During 1917 he picked up a record of seven victories over the Germans. In the last encounter of this seven he met his death, as an excellent shooting pilot, an antagonist ripped the side off his Niépourt. By the end of the war he had 10 aerial victories to his credit and a Military Cross.
