Two witnesses gave evidence yesterday at the trial of Earl Lund, Hilson Roberts, A. Gallant, and Elmer Lund, who appeared before Magistrate Donald MacKinnon on a charge of having stolen goods in their possession. The witnesses were Messrs James Robinson, liquor vendor, and Norman MacLeod, accountant for the Prohibition Commission. Mr. Robinson related the discovery of the loss of the liquor, and the condition in which he found the store Sunday afternoon.

Mr. MacLeod testified as to the amount of liquor in the store, and the checking of the missing goods. Mr. Alban Farmer appeared for the Crown and Mr. R. R. Bell for the defendants. The case was adjourned till today at 3 o'clock.

Bridge Rules Are Changed By Its Solons

NEW YORK, Nov. 1—Doubled not vulnerable under-trick penalties are increased, in the main, by a new code of laws for contract announced today and effective Tuesday. The penalty of 50 per trick for undoubted not vulnerable under-tricks is retained because the authorities thought that removal of the completely phisic possibility would deprive the game of much of its zest.

Penalties Decreased Some vulnerable penalties are decreased in an effort to attain better balance. The first not vulnerable doubled under-trick is penalized 100 points and there is an increase of 50 points in penalty with each succeeding under-trick. Thus the second under-trick costs 150 points and the total penalty for two down is 250, the third under-trick cost 200 and the total penalty for three down is 450.

Doubled not vulnerable under-tricks and undoubted vulnerable under-tricks count the same.

Five Major Changes Five major changes in scoring have been made by the Whist Club (New York), the Port and Club of London and the Commission Francaise Du Bridge with endorsement by representatives of leading American organizations.

Games no trump counts 100 points, same as game at diamonds or clubs, instead of 105 points. The change is produced by according 30 points to the odd-numbered no trump tricks and 40 to the even, instead of a uniform 35.

Bonuses for grand slams have been increased to 1,500 not vulnerable and 2,250 points vulnerable. Undoubted overtricks have been changed to the suit value. One

COMMISSIONER HAY SHORTLY TO VISIT LOCAL S. A. CORPS

Has World Wide Reputation For Evangelical, Social And Missionary Work With Salvation Army.

Commissioner James Hay, who visits Charlottetown on Nov. 6th is the Head of the Salvation Army for Canada, Newfoundland and Alaska. As an Officer of the Salvation Army he has a unique record in several respects. He is now in his fiftieth year of service, and is the senior Commissioner of the Salvation Army, as well as the senior Territorial Commander.

In the great ramifications of the Salvation Army's evangelical, social and missionary work, Commander Hay has a world wide experience, having commanded the evangelical work throughout Great Britain, Australia, South Africa, New Zealand, and has also visited most of the chief countries of the world. He has had a wide experience in the teaching work of the Salvation Army, having been principal of the International Training College in London, England.

In material affairs the Commissioner has been a great Army builder in that not less than six hundred halls and as many Social homes have been erected and carried through largely because of his

inspiration and management. Sixty new social institutions, caring for large numbers of Orphans and necessitous men, women and children have been established through his labours.

During the Great War, Commissioner Hay had an exceptional experience in Australia in that he not only provided from Army workers, thirty-three Chaplains, but had an outstanding record in all classes of operations on behalf of the Australian troops. As a recognition of this work, His Majesty, King George V honored him by appointment as an Officer of the British Empire.

The Commissioner has had many other great experiences, the founder of the Army, General William Booth, having travelled with him in many places. He will speak in Charlottetown, as "one having authority" and personal knowledge of the great questions affecting the world's religions, the marvelous success of the Salvation Army's evangelical operations and its unique record in social uplift, affecting tens of thousands of people.

Sadler Sees New Age in Education

RUGBY, Eng., Nov. 1—"We have come to the end of an epoch and are painfully beholding the birth of a new age," Sir Michael Sadler, famous British educationist, said in delivering the annual Frank Metcalfe Memorial lecture here.

He referred to the life of the distinguished educationist, during which period, Sir Michael said, the enlargement of English education was on a scale beyond all precedent. Signs and portents now suggested the new epoch.

The change in education — "in our ideas of what a liberal education fitted for modern needs consists of"—would first come on the continent, secondly in Scotland and then in England, Sir Michael predicted. "It will come slowly because rightly education is conservative and one of its duties is to link the generations one with the other." The change would touch secondary education first, the universities next and ultimately would color primary education, he added.

Sir Michael explained the continent would feel the change first because there most progress had been made in secondary education. Scotland would be next because "Scotland is not happy about that part of her education she owes to the thorough going organization of Scottish superintendents." England would come last because, he concluded, "for many generations we have preferred an amalgam of opposites to a clean cut ideology." They would always find an enormous amount of good intermixed with the system they wanted to change, he believed.

It is expected that the new food stuff will prove of great value for daily use in households. Negotiations for manufacture and commercializing of the invention are being carried on with the Reymers sholm works in South Sweden. The experiments have been performed by Dr. Boklund at Mac's-chemical institution in Lund.

Stockholm, Sweden, Nov. 1—A new kind of food preparation invented at the University of Lund in Southern Sweden was demonstrated at the anatomy congress in Lund and aroused great interest among the medical authorities. It is an albuminous compound prepared from soya beans and is inexpensive healthy and highly nutritive. It also contains another important ingredient called lecithin which enters into the yolk of eggs and is utilized by the body for building up nerve and brain cells.
