STRATFORD-ON-AVON, England, April 26—(A.P.)—Representatives of 30 nationalities today celebrated the 369th anniversary of Shakespeare's birthday.

At noon, amidst a fanfare of trumpets, many flags were broken out from flagstaffs on the main street, after which official representatives, preceded by the Mayor's Mace Bearer marched to the Bard's birthplace and later to his tomb, where there was a mountain of flowers.

A picturesque figure in the procession was the South Arabian representative, Sheik Hafiz Wahba, in flowing robes. After the ceremony a luncheon was held in the town hall.

Prime Minister To Attend Celebration

SAINTE JOHN, N. B. April 26—Among the ceremonies which will take place on the occasion of the 150th anniversary of the landing of the Loyalists in Saint John on May 18th next, will be the conferring of the freedom of the city on the Right Hon. R. B. Bennett, Prime Minister of Canada, when he comes to Saint John to deliver the oration upon the sesqui centennial of the landing of the Loyalists.

An interesting programme of events has been staged for the celebration by the committee in charge, according to officials of the Canadian National Railways, and it is expected that a large number of visitors will attend, particularly descendants of Loyalists who are scattered over Canada and the United States.

An invitation to take part in the celebrations has also been extended to Hon. W. D. Herridge, Canadian Minister to the United States at Washington, D. C., and Mrs. Herridge, the latter being a sister of the Prime Minister and a native of New Brunswick.

Glenwood Fire

Divine worship in the Glenwood United Church on Sunday, April 23, at 11 a. m. was suddenly interrupted by a volume of smoke sweeping past the Church windows, and upon investigation it was found that the store, warehouse and dwelling house of Mr. E. L. McDougall of Glenwood Hill, just across the river, was in flames. Mr. McDougall's family and Mr. Howatt were in church. The entire congregation at once started for

and all the stock was a complete loss.

He succeeded in saving his motor truck, credit for which is due to Mr. Wilfred Hickey, who also succeeded in saving Mr. McDougall's car. The wind veered a little during the fire, and this together with the heroic efforts of the crowd prevented the destruction of two houses immediately in the path of the flames. The mission church of Glenwood, was also in the path of the fire.

The cause of the conflagration was unknown as around 10 a. m. no fire was noticed, as people passed to Church. One resident, Mr. John Currie, came near losing his life, as trying to save goods from upstairs, in the dwelling, he found the escape by the stairs cut off by flames and was obliged to get out through a window. Good work was done before the arrival of the Church congregation, by Messrs Wilfred Hickey, John Currie, James and Albert McIssac, and Joseph Boutier.

Several people had minor injuries, including Mrs. Howatt, who valiantly climbed through the window of the store to save the books. Much sympathy is felt for Mr. McDougall and Mr. Howatt, as it is a sad sight to watch a complete home wiped out of existence within a few hours, also the means of making a livelihood for another family. Mr. McDougall's blacksmith shop was saved, but grave fears are felt for his foxes, as at this time of year a large fire near a fox ranch may have serious results. A small amount of insurance is on both losses.—O.

Debased Tribes Of West Africa Eat Their Dead

GUELPH, Ont., April 24—(C. P.)—Rev. H. L. Davey, visiting here on furlough after many years in Liberia, West Africa, recounted many strange experiences he and his wife had undergone in the hinterland where they worked as missionaries for the Union of Regular Baptist Churches. Mr. and Mrs. Davey will return in June to continue their work in Africa after a visit at Mr. Davey's home in Ottawa.

Before commencing his work in Liberia, Mr. Davey served in the mission fields in Rhodesia but he stated he has never, in all his African experience, met tribes so debased as those among which he is working now. He said he will return to work among a race of people who eat their own dead, no matter from what cause they die.

Mr. Davey declared when he first founded his station, he was granted a hillside by the native chief, on which to erect buildings. He found the natives diffident about approaching the station and later discovered the hillside was reputedly the abode of evil spirits and the white men and women must surely die within a short time. The fact they were able to withstand the influence of evil agencies added considerably to their prestige.

Periodically, said Mr. Davey, natives dig up what remains of men who have been dead more than seven years and solemnly proceed to celebrate the occasion with trade goods. At a funeral, the number of gin bottles on the grave indicates the standing of the deceased in the community and the same applies to a "grave cleaning."

Rice is the standard article of diet, varied by rats and snakes, which are regarded as delicacies, said the missionary.

Missionaries have received the utmost courtesy and co-operation from the Liberian Government, said Mr. Davey. The Government is composed of negroes whose ancestors were freed slaves in United States and who went to Liberia to found a country of their own.

Rotary Annual Early In June

SAULT STE MARIE, Ont., April 24—(C. P.)—Arrangements are under way for the 35th District of Rotary International annual meeting to be held here June 5 and 6. Preparations are being made to accommodate between 500 and 600 Rotarians and their wives. Representation is expected to come from 33 clubs in the district, boasting a membership of 1,600. All clubs, with the exception of the local one, are situated in Michigan.

While plans have not been completed, June 5 will see the Governor's banquet and ball, and Tuesday, June 6, a cabaret dance will feature. When the convention is over, Rotarians will visit Agawa Canyon, where a fish dinner will be served.

Entertainment of Rotarians' wives will be looked after by wives of local Rotarians. Golf and dinners are on the agenda for the fair visitors. Alfred Allcock is chairman of the various business committees in charge of the convention while accommodation and entertainment committee is headed by Dr. Nelson Graham.

SHAW'S SATIRE HAS NEW RIVAL

LONDON, April 26—"Caesar's Friend," produced by the Catholic Stage Guild, at the Westminster Theatre, arises at times to a quality, according to some critics, of which Bernard Shaw himself might not be ashamed.

This story of the first Good Friday has been adapted for the stage by Campbell Dixon and Dermot Morrah. The satirical passages in the dialogue in the earlier scenes are obviously intended to show that bureaucracy has not altered so much in the last 2,000 years. "What will history care about the fate of an obscure tribe and the blunder of a civil servant?" is the agitated comment of Pilate, as he looks out to the Hill of Calvary with its three Crosses. The portrait presented of Caiaphas, although not so prominent, is nevertheless very impressive. The play up to now has only been given a single performance in the West End, but there is a proposal to revive it for Holy Week.

A Repertory Theatre has been secured for Stoke-on-Trent, to serve the surrounding towns so familiar to the readers of Arnold Bennett. Five of six plays a year are to be produced, and probably the works of Barrie and Galsworthy will be prominent.

POSTHUMOUS HONORS

LONDON, April 26—(C.P.)—Having fought a lion with bare hands to save a comrade from death the late Reginald Henry Montague Gray, clerk to the magistrate in Ngamiland, Bechuanaland, has the posthumous honor of being awarded the medal of the civil division of the Order of the British Empire, with the approval of the King. The official account of Gray's victory is thus briefly given:

"Whilst on an expedition in August, 1932, Mr. Gray attempted to save a comrade from a wounded lion. Mr. Gray, who had as his only weapon an empty shotgun, clubbed the lion, which had attacked his companion, until the gun broke. He then tried, while kicking the animal, to pull it away with his hands. The lion was eventually shot by a third person. Mr. Gray died a few days later, as a result of shock."

ELK ISLE MINES WILL BE ACTIVE

THE PAS, Man. April 26—(C.P.)—Jowsey Island, a small bit of rock at the southwest tip of Elk Island, God's Lake, will be a hive of mining activity this summer. Machinery has been flown in to the property and drillers are now on the location. Three shafts will be sunk.

In other parts of the district crews are assembling for a season of work which, it is expected, will bring this area into production, another big development in the Hudson Bay region.

Another discovery in this district, said to be of importance, has been made by the only white trapper in the district, Carl Sherman. Three miles from the Jowsey properties, 14 claims already have been staked.
