DELEGATES APPOINTED BY CANADIAN LEGION - At a special meeting of the Charlottetown Branch of the Canadian Legion held yesterday afternoon the following were appointed delegates to represent the Branch at the provincial convention to be held at Charlottetown August 7th. PREPARING FOR REFUGEE CHILDREN - Although the arrival in this country of evacuee children has been postponed for the present, arrangements are being made for receiving them in this province if the British Government decides to revive the plan. Upon arrival in each province the children must be subjected to a ten days quarantine period before being distributed to the various foster homes. In this connection, a large home of Mr. Guy Stewart, Bellevue, near Tea Hill, and within eight miles of the city, has been recommended as an ideal site for a depot to house the evacuee children during this quarantine period. The recommendation has been made to the Government by the Refugee Committee of the Carry on Canada Corps of which Mr. J. O. Hyndman is the chairman. Evacuee children will be medically examined at provincial distributing centres and not at the debarkation port. Unless parents are conscientious objectors against vaccination, each child will be vaccinated against smallpox and inoculated against diphtheria.

TORONTO, July 18.-(CP)-The Canadian Active Service Force will obtain a complete medical unit of 100 doctors under a training scheme arranged here last night. This number of members of the Canadian Army Medical Corps Veterans' Association have agreed to undergo an eight-weeks training course to prepare for enlistment in a body with the C.A.S.F.
