FALL OF GREEK MINISTRY CAUSES SENSATION IN LONDON

Possibility of New Cabinet Deciding to Enter War on Side of Entente Allies. King Constantine Evidently Impressed with Improved Position of Allies and May be Willing to Embark on Operations Against Bulgarians Whom Greeks Suspect of Designs on Kavala. Roumania also More Favorably Disposed Towards Taking a Hand Against Bulgaria.

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, Nov. 4.—The defeat of the Greek Government in the Chamber of Deputies and the consequent resignation of the Zaimis Cabinet is the latest sensation afforded by the Balkans.

It is not forgotten that King Constantine was willing to follow the policy of M. Venizelos to a certain point and that there are some diplomats who believe that with the assured landing of very strong Anglo-French forces at Saloniki and Kavala together with the Russian army on the other side of Thrace, and the possible assistance of Roumania, the Greek King might be willing to embark on operations against Bulgaria.

From unofficial sources it is reported the Russians are advancing in strong force and have captured important positions near Gzernowitz, a movement calculated more than anything else to influence Roumania. The Serbians, who are making a stand in the south, where they are supported by British and French, continue their retirement before the Austro-Germans and Bulgarians.

ANOTHER TURNOVER IN GREEK CABINET

Zaimis Party Defeated on Question of Foreign Policy. Venizelos Finds it Impossible to Support Government in Policy Which He Considers Harmful to Country.

PARIS, Nov. 4.—The Zaimis Government was defeated in a vote of confidence on foreign politics in parliament to-day, and is expected to resign, says a Havas despatch from Athens. A discussion of proposed military laws, the correspondent says, raised a question between the minister of war, General Yanakitzas and the majority party of the former Premier Venizelos.
