knowledge of the scientific basis of her work. The provision of basic scientific instruction for young women who intend to become nurses, but who are not old enough to begin hospital work was also considered.

In both cases it was suggested a diploma of nursing should be issued, and that the University should give one year's instruction. Sir James Barrett, vice-chancellor of Melbourne University since 1931, writing on this topic, says:

"It may be well to indicate what has been done in other countries. A magnificent volume on the subject of nursing education issued by the Rockefeller Foundation sets out the case in considerable detail. Curiously enough, the nursing educational problem has been faced excellently in Slam, where the Queen has taken a personal interest in the establishment of the college. In Great Britain two universities, those of London and Leeds, issue a diploma of nursing. In Canada, four types of nurses are trained: the bedside nurse; the public health nurse; the bedside nurse who does a year's scientific work in addition to her training, in order to get a basic knowledge of her profession, and the student of the long course of five years, which leads to the degree of bachelor of science in nursing.

"There is emerging a desire on the part of women engaged in nursing to elevate their calling into a learned profession and to understand fully what it is they are trying to do. I am afraid that a good many medical practitioners

would make bad nurses; and it is certain that most nurses would make bad medical practitioners. I have no doubt that many of the nurses will be able to state their case much better than I can; but the sympathies of thoughtful medical practitioners will be with the nurses in their effort to obtain such knowledge as will fit them fully to appreciate the significance of the work they are doing and its exceeding importance. They are really a social necessity," Sir James added.

"The author of the section on British nursing in the Rockefeller Foundation publication sadly directs attention to the fact that thousands of women become stenographers—an overcrowded occupation. In Melbourne numbers of capable women become graduates in arts and science, and, apart from the cultural advantages of such a training, they have learned nothing which definitely fits them for professional occupations of service to the State. If a number of them devoted themselves to the nursing profession, whether they practised or whether they did not, they would provide an immense force in social uplift, and would influence the health and social sanity of the entire population."

No Comforts For Future Irish Babies

BELFAST, Ireland, Sept. 26.—After fighting a long and losing battle against the baby's comforter or

"husher", the Belfast Board of Health has applied to Parliament to banish this unhealthy article from the North of Ireland.

If Dr. C. S. Thomson, Medical Superintendent of Health, had his way, it will be an offence, punishable by fine not exceeding ten dollars, to import into the country, or to sell "the article known as the baby's comforter."

He has been successful in incorporating this clause in a health Bill soon to be promoted in the Northern Ireland Parliament.
