## OPTIMISM EVIDENT RE SANCTIONS

### Success Visioned By League Circles As Seven More Nations Remove Arms Embargo On Ethiopia.

GENEVA, Oct. 17.—Stern penalties against Italy soon will be in effect despite apparent obstacles met in voting them, League of Nations circles here believed tonight. Growing optimism was evident. Seven more nations have joined the ranks of those which already have applied "sanction no. one"—removal of the arms embargo on Ethiopia and imposition of one on Italy. France, Poland, Chile, Greece, Finland, Cuba and Colombia notified the League today that they had begun enforcement of the penalty. Great Britain and Belgium...

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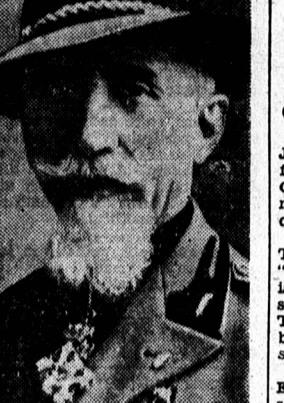
