TRAFFIC GOOD IN WEST CANADA

Canadian Pacific Official Report Larger Western Passenger Receipts Than Last Year By Ten To Twenty Per Cent

WINNIPEG, March 31—(Special)—Reports made to officials of the C. P. R. in Montreal show that in spite of the failure of the wheat crop in portions of the west last year and consequently depressions in certain branches of commerce the receipts from the passenger business of the Western lines of that company for the present season are considerably in excess of the receipts for the corresponding period a year ago.

ROOSEVELT ON ANARCHISTS

Determined to Wage Vigorous Campaign Against Those Advocating Murder

NEW YORK, March 30—The Herald publishes the following—

President Roosevelt is determined to begin a vigorous campaign against anarchists who in speech or by publication advocate crime and defiance of the law. If there is no criminal law under which the authorities can act, the President will ask Congress to enact such a law. He has called the attention of the Department of Justice to the matter and has asked for recommendations on which to base a report to Congress.

This decision is the outcome of a communication from Mayor McBride, of Paterson, requesting the President to use his authority to suppress La Question Sociale, an anarchist publication, sent through the mails to all parts of the country.

"After you have concluded your investigation I wish a report from you to serve as a basis for recommendations by me for action by Congress. Under section No. 3,893 of the Revised Statutes, books and letters for indecent uses are excluded from the mail, and process is made for imprisonment of those guilty. The newspaper article in question advocates murder by dynamite. It especially advocates the murder of enlisted men of the United States Army and the officers of the police force and the burning of the houses of private citizens. The preaching of murder and arson, if it is not already forbidden by law, should be forbidden."

SAD FATALITY IN YARMOUTH

Accidental Discharge Of Gun In street Kills Young Woman In Her Home

YARMOUTH, March 31—(Special)—A sad fatality occurred yesterday at Yarmouth Bar, near here.

The bullet ploughed through the wall of the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Nelson Crowell and struck their daughter Beatrice in the stomach, inflicting injuries from which she died this morning.

SUES PASTOR FOR FUNERAL SERMON

Angered at Remarks Made at Services Over His Wife's Body.

READING, Pa., March 30—The Rev. Marvia H. Stettler, one of the best known Lutheran clergymen in Pennsylvania, was arrested this afternoon on a charge of slander preferred by Jeremiah Werner, of Mohrsville.

The Rev. Mr. Stettler preached the funeral sermon, during which he is said to have referred to Mr. Werner as a man with a heart of stone, showing no signs of grief. Mr. Werner alleges that the pastor followed this up with remarks such as these: "This man knocked his wife down so that she fell to the floor, the week before she was taken ill. He did not furnish her with clothing and shoes fit to go in church. See him as she sits unmoved with no feeling in the presence of the body of his helpmeet."

VANCOUVER, March 30—(Special)—A disastrous fire almost consumed the entire Indian Village of Schelt, sixty miles up the coast.

HALF A DOZEN TIMES ENGAGED

Roman Church will Try to Prevent Frivolous Engagements.

HAMILTON, March 29—One point especially emphasized in the new marriage laws read in the Catholic churches of the city, deals with matrimonial engagements. The church decrees that every prenuptial contract is void unless it is written and duly attested.

"It will stop frivolous and foolish engagements made today only to be broken to-morrow," said Rev. Dean Mahoney of St. Mary's Cathedral. Some people, he said, were engaged half a dozen times before they were married.

According to Dean Mahoney, a very mistaken view was got abroad through the papers of how the new law will affect mixed marriages. "It has been stated," he said, "that there will be no more mixed marriages. This is entirely incorrect. The power of the bishop will be exactly the same after the law has gone into effect as in the past. The bishop will have the same power to grant dispensations. This explanation is not made with a view of encouraging mixed marriages. You know very well it is only with great reluctance and sorrow that these dispensations are granted."

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE
