#### THE IMPROVED INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSONS

Fourth Quarter: Lesson XI: Isaiah XXXVII 5-11: 14-20 December 11  
Golden Text: Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace whose mind is stayed on thee because he trusteth on thee. Isaiah XXVI

#### ISAIAH COUNSELS RULERS (The Story)

Judah was not Sennacherib's real objective. He was leading his army against Egypt. But to reach his destination he must pass through the comparatively insignificant realm of the Hebrews. He deemed that nothing there could prove more than a momentary impediment. The proud conqueror however was ignorantly omitting the invisible factor in the equation, namely the God of the Hebrews. The prophet describes the approach of the World-conqueror with nervous energy and picturesque-ness. One by one the defended cities fall before him. Jerusalem alone remains inviolate. The ruthless invader even now stands near and threatens his hand threateningly at the daughter of Zion.

For the first time in his long and glorious reign Hezekiah falters in faith. The price to pay for which the temple must be stripped. But that is nothing compared with the loss of moral tones incurred in the defection from Jehovah, and commencing with a blasphemous enemy. The loss of morale was quickly illustrated by the delirious excitement of the people as they watched from the walls the hostile cohorts passing by, their failure to heed the call to humiliation, their riotous gluttony and their want of appreciation of the price at which immunity had been purchased.

How short the respite! Sennacherib gives the lie to that vaunt inscription at Karsabad which describes him as an "Observer of Sworn Faith." How soon he is back under the walls of Jerusalem. The indemnity just paid is ignored. Sennacherib's representatives do not notice Hezekiah's messenger. They cunningly address themselves to the people on the wall. They put the finishing touches to the morals of the garrison. This insulting embassy is followed by a letter from Sennacherib, the language of which is described as "terrible grievousness."

The extremity is reached. "Hezekiah is as a bird in a cage." This is the dilemma; on the one hand resistance which means defeat and all the barbarities in that day practiced on prisoners of war; on the other hand surrender which means denationalism and deportation of the population according to the fixed policy of the Assyrians. In this extremity Hezekiah regains his faith. He takes the letter of the idolitrous enemy into the temple and kneeling at the altar spreads it out before the Lord. He says "Unvarying and varied." A sign sweeps the Judean plain at night and the sleeping enemy drinks in death through open mouth. The next day the crimson shields of Assyria cover the pillars so lately stripped to buy that worthless truce.

One great page of world-history turns that day. On its under side Assyria disappears and Babylonia comes to light.

#### UNDER THE STUDY LAMP

War was Sennacherib's occupation. His business was to collect treasure, exact tribute and make his captives slaves. He was a great builder also. He repaired and enlarged Niveh making it second to none in extent and splendor. After reigning twenty years he probably suffered the violent death he had meted out to so many others. He is chiefly interesting to the Bible reader because of his unsuccessful effort to subdue Judah. Lord Byron celebrates his defeat in one of his noblest poems. In the long line of the Kings of Judah Hezekiah stands conspicuous. Only two others vie with him in eminence and virtue. He purged his kingdom of idolatry, sweeping away the "high places" and even the blazing serpent of the Wilderness, which had become an object of worship. The great king was matched by a great prophet. The influence of Isaiah in church and state can be traced in the successive events. If anyone doubts the utility and power of prayer let him open his Bible to this picture of the king spreading the letter of Sennacherib upon the altar and appealing to God for deliverance. The historic event of an enemy "unsmeared by the sword in answer to the king's petition for three thousand years has been a glorious memorial of answer to prayer. Nations of today in time of peril may not use the ancient prayer "Jehovah our God save us!"
