The latest news, first of all.

The mail train arrived in this city last night at ten o'clock.

Rev. R. M. Fenton, of this province, was in Halifax yesterday.

The Northumberland took about fifteen passengers across to Pictou yesterday morning.

Geo. W. McPhee, City, High Secretary of the I. O. F., will visit Court Westmoreland, Crapaud, on Saturday evening next May 21st.

Charles E. McDonald and Albert Crosby, Summerside, drove to the city Saturday and returned yesterday. Their many friends were delighted to see them again.

The People's Theatre last night presented a program of unusual excellence, the great feature being a series of slides connected with the life of the late beloved monarch. In succession were shown the King's baptism, his picture as a midshipman, the ship he served in, his meeting with Queen Alexandria, his coronation, his attempted assassination, etc., and closed with the pictures of the seven Edwards. As a tribute to the great Ruler, the manager requested that when the Union Jack was put on the screen, the people would stand and sing "God Save the King." The request was responded to generously, and when the first chord was struck the audience rose in a body, and never has the Market Hall echoed the grand old air as heartily.

Miss M. A. Enelgrove, Kent St., City, has a souvenir in connection with the visit of King Edward VII to this city in 1860 when he was Prince of Wales, that has been preserved all these years in her home. This souvenir is a flag made by a member of her family now deceased, which was flown from the old building which was burned down and which stood on the site of the present building the day the Prince of Wales passed along Kent Street on horseback this flag was one of the most prominent flown and today, although slightly faded from age, is almost as serviceable as when first flown in honor of Edward's visit to this province. It was specially made for this purpose and afterward was used for every special event requiring the flying of flags. It was flown at the time of the Queen's Jubilee and at every successive triumphal event in connection with the South African war. Another interesting relic of this event is in the possession of J. H. Gates, City, who on that occasion drove the carriage and pair of white horses that contained the Prince of Wales and the Duke of Newcastle from Government House to the Provincial Building where a grand ball took place. The streets were lined on each side with men holding blazing torches and in the excitement and the noise of music and hurrahing, inseparable from a social event, it required a skillful driver to pilot the spirited horses, conveying their Royalties. Mr. Gates, at that time was a Lieutenant in the Cavalry Company here and formed one of the mounted escorts who accompanied the Prince on a ride through Charlottetown and around the Royalty. Although fifty years have elapsed since then, Mr. Gates has the running gear of the carriage which carried the Prince and Duke and this season had it repainted and it is still in good condition. He is one of the gentlemen today living in Prince Edward Island, who is known to have lived under four British rulers, namely, William Fourth, Victoria, Edward Seventh and George Fifth.

AGAINST SUNDAY "COMICS."

CINCINNATI, May 15—The comic supplement of the Sunday newspapers were criticised at today's session of the 10th biennial convention of the General Federation of Women's Clubs. Mrs. Sarah A. Evans of Portland, Or., chairman of the press committee, took a fling at the supplements in her report.

"There never was a meeting of the federation when the colored supplements did not come in for criticism," said Mrs. Evans, "but the papers give the public what it wants. We will have to work on the public, not on the papers, to do away with the yellow supplements, sensational news and records of crime."

DUNDONALD WILL BE AIDE TO ROOSEVELT

LONDON, May 15—When Col Roosevelt arrives here on Monday morning he will have dropped the role of a private citizen and so will be accorded the honors due to the special American ambassador to the funeral of King Edward VII.

King George today designated two of his aides de camp to attend upon the American Ambassador during his stay in England. These are Lord Dundonald, formerly commander of the Canadian Militia, and Commander Charles K. F. Cunningham-Griffin. The aides de camp will meet Mr. Roosevelt at Queensborough and accompany him to London.
