FRUIT GROWERS' BULLETIN

Beware of Mice in Orchards. To those of the fruit growers of Prince Edward Island who have suffered from the attacks of the mice last winter on their tender trees no word of ours it is to be hoped will be needed; to all others having small or large plantations let us give a few directions so that further trouble may be obviated. Depredations are usually greatest when the orchard is in sod and when there is rubbish lying about; hence the latter should be removed before the winter sets in. In most cases it is not necessary nor advisable to have the orchard in sod, particularly when there are young trees, although it is highly important to have a cover crop which is also sometimes a harbor for mice. As mice may be expected every winter in greater or less numbers, young trees should be regularly protected against their ravages. Mice usually begin working on the ground under the snow and when they come to a tree they will begin to gnaw it if it is not protected. A small mound of soil from 8 to 12 inches high packed around the tree will often turn them, and even snow tramped about the tree has been quite effectual. The cheapest and surest practice is to wrap the trees with ordinary building paper, the price of which need not be taken into consideration as it is so little. Far paper is also effectual, but trees have been injured by using it and it is well to guard against danger. A little earth should be put out the lower end to prevent the mice from beginning to work there. A. E. BURKE, Pres't. F. G. A.
