Gunder Haegg Sets New U.S. Mile Run Record

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., July 25—(AP)—Gunder Haegg, who admits that he runs only fast enough to win, ran the fastest mile in United States outdoor track history—4:04.3—last night to defeat Gil Dodds of Boston by 10 yards and Bill Hulse of New York by 15 before a delirious crowd of 10,000 at Harvard stadium.

Haegg virtually ran a front race from start to finish to lower Glenn Cunningham's American record, made back in 1934, by 14 seconds.

By so going, Haegg came within seven tenths of a second of his own world mile record, which recently was lowered to 4:02.5 by Arne Anderson in Sweden.

Dodds, who overtook Hulse with a terrific finishing drive, also finished under the Cunningham record in 4:06.5 and Hulse, who gave Haegg a stiff argument during the first half of the run, was timed in 4:07.8.
