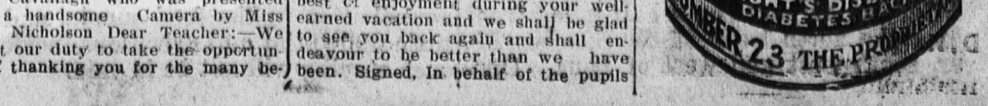

And through the fabric of beauty and adventure is woven the scarlet thread of a powerful and delightful love-story. A vein of sparkling humor permeates the whole play. No one should miss it today and tonight. Such is the verdict of the patrons who saw it yesterday. A clever refined comedy, "The High Cost of Living," featuring the famous performances. 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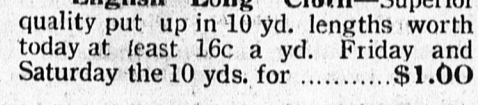
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
