As already been made is being evidenced in a variety of ways, and illustrates the disposition of large operators in various branches of the market to take profits, and then sit idly awaiting developments. What has been feared by some is that this process might go too far, with the result that there would be a tendency to refuse support to the market, at a point sufficiently early to prevent an unreasonable degree of reaction. There has been no indication of any such state of things as yet, but on the contrary, substantial buying has usually made its appearance when holders of stocks have been willing to let them go at concessions. Nevertheless, the doubt as to credit, which has already been suggested, and the notably conservative attitude on the part of bankers, should serve as cautions to the rank and file of investors. There is a fairly general feeling that the structure of the market has been strengthened by the recent readjustments, but no decided alteration of trend can be expected until the credit question is more definitely settled.

**SIXTY-ONE REJECTED FOR GOVERNMENT JOBS**

OTTAWA, April 23.—Sixty-one persons recommended for positions by the civil service commission, have been rejected in the past three years.

according to a reply given in the House of Commons today by Hon. Fernand Rinfret, secretary of state, to E. J. Garland (U. F. A., Bow River). The rejections are provided for under Section 24 of the civil service act. By departments the figures are as follows:

- Agriculture, 4; finance, 5; justice, 1; labor, 1; marine and fisheries, 6; national defence, 3; national revenue, 9; post-office, 23; public printing and stationery, 1; public works, 5; railways and canals, 1; trade and commerce, 2.

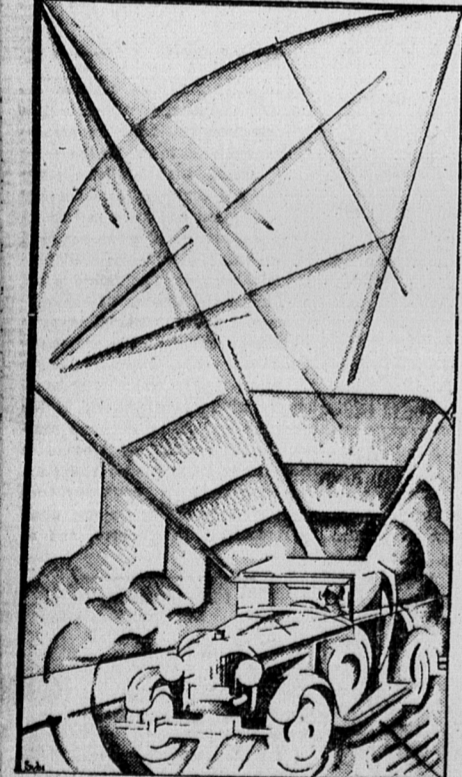

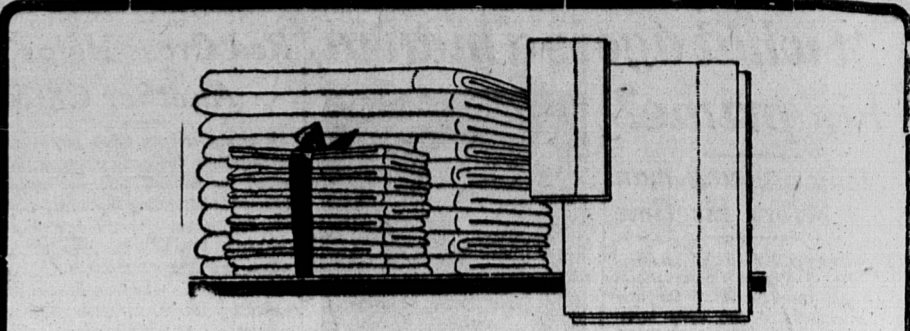
