No Liberal leader in Canada had ever thought of making such a change. If they thought of it, or even dreamed of such a possibility they never mentioned it! And yet, as the B. N. A. Act stood, if the island continued to lose its people as it had been losing them our representation must fall eventually from four to three, from three to two, and from two to one!

Thus desperate was our position with regard to representation when the Dominion and our own province came under Conservative Government in 1911. The census of 1921 showed our population still falling. As we all know, the unit of representation under the B. N. A. Act is still fixed by dividing the population of Quebec Province by 65, which is always the number of members for that province. By that rule how many members would Prince Edward Island be entitled to since the census of 1921? The population of Quebec in that year was 2,361,199.

The unit of that representation since 1921 is therefore 2,361,199 divided by 65, the quotient being 36,326. The population of Prince Edward Island in 1921 was 85,615. Therefore, if we divide 85,615 by 36,326, we shall find how many members our Province would be now entitled to under the B. N. A. Act as it was. The result of this division is two, with a remainder of 15,963. That remainder, if it were equal to one-half of 36,326 would entitle us now to three members. But as it is less than one-half of the representation unit our Province would thereafter be entitled to only two members in the

House of Commons!

This fact is indisputable. But for what Sir Robert Borden and the Conservative party did to save our representation, Prince Edward Island could only have elected three members in the election of 1917 and could have elected only two members last October and only two members in the election on 14th September next! From 1913 till he became Prime Minister he was a Minister in Sir Robert Borden's Cabinet.

We ask our Liberal friends, is there one of them who doubts that the Conservative party saved our representation? To ask the question is to answer it. No one doubts it! Every intelligent elector knows it. And because it was saved we are about to elect four members where we could today elect but two had not the great Conservative party manfully fought and won our battle. That victory was a victory for the Liberals and Conservatives alike. It doubled the representation of every elector in the House of Commons, giving them four members, where they would otherwise now have but two!

Ask your Liberal candidate to write on paper all he can think of that Sir Wilfrid and Mackenzie King did for us or got for us. Then weigh against it the one fact that the Conservative party saved our

representation. Will it not outweigh them all?

Think it over. Who is it that has fought for us and wrought for us in the past and are now again power at Ottawa to continue their good work in our behalf? 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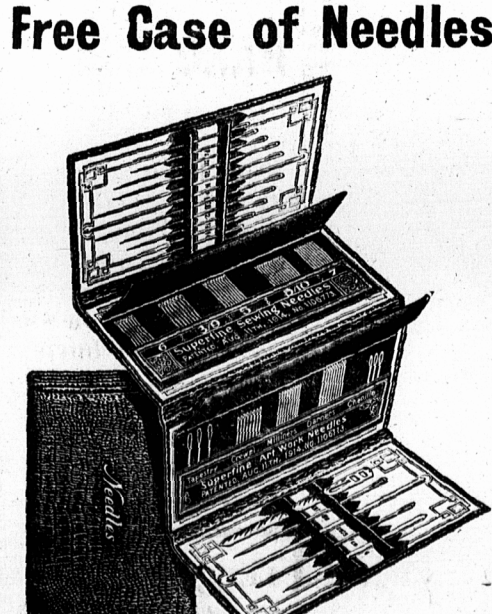
