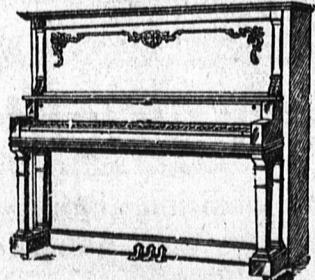

LONDON, February 28.—A Reuter despatch from Petrograd says that yesterday's sitting of the Duma, which was devoted to a discussion of declarations made by the ministers, was remarkable for the fact that, despite the divergencies of views regarding internal political questions, the leaders of all parties were unanimous in affirming that the war must be prosecuted to a victorious conclusion, no matter what sacrifices for the country he involved, because in this way alone could a lasting peace be assured. They unanimously agreed accordingly that it was the duty of the Duma to grant to the government the necessary resources. M. Chouguine, progressive leader of the "white emperor," stamped over the "black emperor," whose most terrible judges would be his own subjects.

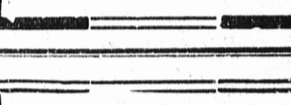
## AMBROSE MALONE
