WAR TREMBLES IN THE BALANCE

Diplomacy Terrified as to What Will Happen in China—Possible Massacre of Foreigners.

Report Says China will Join Forces with Japan—Japan will Attack Russia—Her Best Generals Eager for the Fray—Bennett Burleigh's Cable—The Duty of Britain and the United States.

CHINA MAY JOIN JAPAN. LONDON, Dec. 29.—(Special).—An unconfirmed report says that in the event of war China will join forces with Japan and Japan will send an army corps to Peking.

JAPAN PREPARING FOR WAR. TOKIO, Dec. 29.—(Special).—An emergency ordinance promulgated late last night invests the Government with practically unlimited credit for the purposes of military defence.

WAR TREMBLES IN THE BALANCE. NEW YORK, Dec. 29.—(Special).—Bennett Burleigh cables that "war trembles in the balance."

"Diplomacy is terrified as to what will happen in China if war arises between Russia and Japan."

JAPANESE EAGER FOR THE FRAY. "It is agreed that the Japanese imperial authorities are alert and will attack Russia."

"The best Japanese generals are eager to engage the enemy in Manchuria."

WHAT MAKES IT SERIOUS. "But the real key to the seriousness of the situation is the question, Will there be further terrible outbreaks against foreigners in China, or what steps will Germany and France take if disturbances break out."

DUTY ANGLO-SAXON NATIONS. "Great Britain and the United States should see that if Japan wages a successful war she is not this time to be prevented from reaping the fruits of victory as she was 1895."

Miss Lydia Howett who has been spending a vacation at her home, Lower Montague was a passenger by the Minto yesterday morning en route to the neighboring republic.

William O'Brien, Georgetown's efficient artist, has been making sundry improvement to the Cardigan Manse for the past few days previous to its occupation by Rev. Edwin Smith.

This season promises to be full of excitement as regards hockey. The local clubs will organize Thursday night. The S. S. Minto has already organized and no doubt the S. S. Stanley will soon follow her sister's example.

The announcement made by Rev. F. S. Coffin of his resignation has caused profound regret among our citizens. The Guardian understands that following his physician's advice he will at least for a time discontinue preaching and go West. Mr. Coffin during his brief pastorate here won the confidence and esteem not only of his congregation but of our citizens as a whole. It is indeed doubtful if Georgetown was ever favored with a more brilliant pulpit orator and it is hoped that in some future day we may again be permitted to listen to his thoughtful, logical and interesting addresses. Georgetown has always been too easily satisfied in regard to public works. Our representatives both federal and local have not shown sufficient vim in the past and we hope that the rising generation will set forth their requirements in no uncertain voice.
