## AROUND THE FOX EXCHANGES

A litter of foxes arrived yesterday at the ranch of the Beach Hill Fox Company.

More encouraging news comes in from the ranches. One of the companies ranching in the vicinity of Charlottetown has been presented with five pairs of foxes in their ranch. Mr. James C. Tuplin, of Black Banks, expects a very successful year. He reports that he has thirteen litters out of fifteen pairs of foxes and he expects to raise between forty and fifty pups this season.

Good news comes also from the F. A. Shea ranch at Waterford. Excellent luck seems to have been experienced there this year. Already of the six pairs of foxes on the ranch, five have litters.

The President of the Fox Farmers' Bureau, Mr. Chester McLure, leaves this morning for the Mainland on fox business. His trip will extend over some months and will necessitate some extended travel. It is possible that Mr. McLure's business will even take him to the Old Country.

A studied inquiry among fox ranchers from Summerside and vicinity, as to the results of the season of production on their ranches, shows that, with very few exceptions, this season has been away above the average. Indeed it was ascertained that up to the present there has been, only one litter lost. In some cases, on the other hand, the increase has been abnormal.

Phenomenal indeed are the results reported from one ranch in the western part of the Island. The six pairs of foxes in this ranch have all had pups—one litter containing seven pups, another six pups, and a third, four pups—seventeen pups in three litters!

While on the whole the smaller ranches are reporting excellent results, it is pleasing to note that the larger companies are also doing very successfully, several of them in fact having as bright prospects as are to be found on any ranch.

Mr. George McMarrie, of New Glasgow, N. S., District Superintendent in Nova Scotia of the Fur Farmers' Bureau, is in the city for a few days.

Within the last few days a new feature has sprung up in the fox business, in regard to stock-holdings, and that is—the exchanging of shares of one company for those of another. One of the city exchanges reports satisfactory business in this regard.
