THE cranberry crop on the Island this year is a very small one owing to the dry weather of last spring. C. R. Dickie Muddy Creek, the leading cranberry grower in this Province, says that where he used to get from 150 to 200 bushels he only raised this season about 1 1/2 bushels.

HEARTS will be cheered. THE Town Council has under consideration the matter of adding about 20 lights to the street lighting service and the question of an all night service. This new venture may mean an extra expenditure of four or five hundred dollars annually. It is true that this town has not by any means sufficient lighting; it remains to be disputed also that the price now paid for light is about as high as the town with its present source of revenue is in a position to pay towards this service. The matter then resolves itself into the one vital question; how is lighting enough to meet the wishes of the people to be obtained without over-taxing the rate-payers. For the present lighting system the town pays \$778 for 38 lights (32 c. p.) with only a half night service, or a little over \$20 a light per year. For an all night service with 55 lights the citizens are asked to pay \$25 per light, or \$1,375 per year. This is the offer of the Summerside Electric Co. The Town Council offers \$1,200 for 60 lights. The cautious citizens will view the offer made by the council as quite large enough, considering the town's small revenue, and the offer of the Electric Co., really beyond the town's means. It is assumed that the Electric Co. know their own business. Take it for granted also that the town will pause and consider before entering into a contract which will burden the tax payers to the extent of about \$500 increased expenditure for lighting. If the town is to have more light the cost must be carefully considered. The service is not what it ought to be. But are there not other more pressing needs? Can the town not afford to wait awhile and consider the advisability of owning and controlling its own lighting system. It has been the history of all progressive towns that trouble begins when the town's interests are allowed to be handicapped by any company whose interests are their own. Municipal control of town lighting is always the most satisfactory; and until Summerside owns and manages an electric plant citizens may expect to be confronted with difficulties in the way of rates and satisfactory lighting.

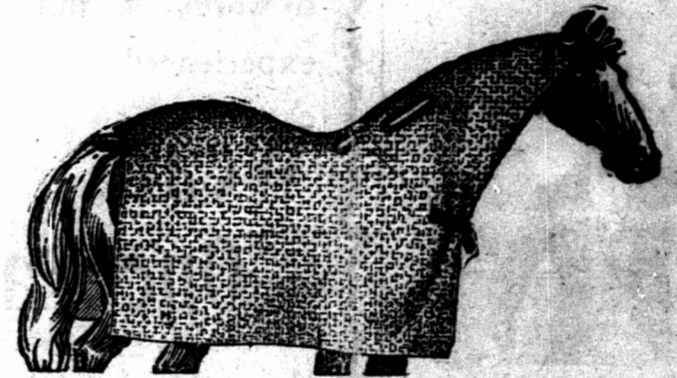
