POTATO INSPECTION

Continued from page 1 some fields but late blight has not yet appeared except in small patches.

However, the cool, wet weather now prevailing has increased the danger of infection. Late blight has already appeared in Canada, an infected field being found in Manitoba on July 13.

Colorado potato beetle larvae are now quite prevalent in fields all over the Province, it is reported. Potato aphids have been found in many fields and it is expected that populations will build up in the next few weeks.

Potato flies and tarnished plant bugs are also present in small numbers. To control these pests growers are advised to apply D.D.T. 50 per cent wettable at the rate of 2 lbs per 100 gallons or D.D.T. 25 per cent emulsion at the rate of 1 quart per 100 gallons.

In view of the late blight threat it is advisable to include the D.D.T. with a fungicide such as Bordeaux mixture or other copper spray material.

Continued from page 1 ment early this week on Newfoundland's next constitutional step.

It was reported Friday that the Dominion government would recommend to Canada that it take Newfoundland into confederation.

Sir Gordon issued a "no-statement" statement Saturday. He said: "As the result of the voting in a number of districts being still awaited, it is not possible to make a full statement at this time. The United Kingdom and Canada Governments are being kept fully informed of the results of the poll and a further statement will be made as soon as practicable."

R.A. MacKay of the External Affairs Department at Ottawa was scheduled to arrive here today. Though no other details were available, it was presumed he would first hold discussions with the Canadian High Commissioner to Newfoundland.

With final results in from all but three districts, including Labrador, the referendum showed 77,268 in favor of confederation and 71,374 for responsible government. This was about 53 per cent for union with Canada.

MYSTERY BOMBER

Continued from page 1 was reported as Miami, Fla., and the eight other men made the trip back from the Azores in a Pan American Airways plane. They made the return trip at their own expense.

They were met at New York by officials from the F.B.I. and five other Government departments—Immigration, Public Health, Customs, State Department and Civil Aeronautics Administration.

Schindler who piloted the B-27 from here to Halifax and then to the Azores before it was impounded there had only a health examination and a brief spell with the customs men before the F.B.I. whisked him away.

The F.B.I. said the full charge against Schindler was "unlawfully, willingly and knowingly attempting to export 'airplane, arms, munitions and implements of war' from the United States to Canada without a licence.

Meanwhile two of the men were ordered held by immigration authorities because their papers "were not in order."

They were Hyman Mark, 26, and Scholom Solowitz, 26, both of Brooklyn.

The six others went through vaccinations, customs inspections of their belongings and immigration questions. Then a State Department representative picked up their passports, and permitted them to leave.

They declined to talk to reporters. Earlier, the United States Coast Guard said there were nine men aboard the plane when it landed in the Azores. This tallied with the first dispatch from Halifax on the B-17's take-off.

News dispatches from the Azores, however, said there were 18 men aboard the plane when it landed there.

The four-engined plane had been held up by Portuguese authorities in the Azores after the flight from Halifax.

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Modern School For Southport

Plans for a new type of school, the first of its kind in the Province, were discussed at a meeting of trustees and ratepayers at Southport last week.

The school building will be equipped with a new system of lighting known as clerestory lighting, giving a more uniform supply of light in classrooms, as well as with central heating and probably air conditioning.

It will have flush toilets, drinking fountains and will be completely insulated.

The building proposed for the Southport school is 68 feet by 26 feet. It will contain two class rooms. One of them will be 20 feet by 26 feet and the other 20 feet by 26 feet.

The main entrance will be 10 feet by 12 feet and immediately back of it is space for the toilets.

The heating will be from a hot air furnace under the central part of the building with conduits to carry the warm air to the classrooms.

The type of the building is based on that developed by the Ontario Department of Education after devoting a great deal of time and money to research work.

The idea was to provide the best possible type of building at the minimum cost without sacrificing anything in the comfort and well-being of pupils and teachers, nor to the general efficiency of the building.

The school is patterned after the one now in use at Glenwood in the Nelson township of Ontario. But the building planned here is adapted to suit rural needs.

One of the advantages of the construction is that an additional room or rooms can be built on at any time it might prove to be necessary, without rearranging the general structure.

The task of selecting the site and making all the other necessary arrangements is left with the trustees and the building committee selected by the district.

The trustees are Raymond MacDonald, Harold MacKie and Ambrose Duffy with Mr. John Reddin as secretary.

The building committee are Malcolm MacDonald, Ernest Burke, Joe Hayley, Alex MacDowell and Dr. J. P. Lantz.

The district will receive \$750 from the government to help in construction. This is under the government plan to help two years ago which makes available a maximum of \$500 for one room school and an additional \$250 for additional rooms up to a maximum of \$1250.

The government assistance plan calls for a school ground of at least one acre. The present school ground at Southport is considerably smaller than that, and the present building and grounds will likely be sold just as soon as the new building is ready for occupancy.

Two ratepayers of the district offered ground free of charge if more centrally located sites were not available. They were Roland MacDonald and Dr. J. P. Lantz. But in both cases the land was not deemed to be located centrally enough to warrant accepting the offers.
