QUEEN SQUARE ICE SPORTS CARRIED OUT SUCCESSFULLY

S. D. U. Wins Hockey Game by Score of 2 to 0—Skating Events Fast in Spite of Soft Ice.

The annual Queen Square School Ice Sports were carried out last night at the Arena Rink in very successful style, and were attended by a crowd of spectators that crowded the large rink to the doors, and evidenced its enjoyment of the different events enthusiastically and in a manner.
The skating races, which formed the main part of the program, were efficiently conducted, and followed one another with but little loss of time. Some fast young skaters were seen in action for the first time, and not a few gave signs of much promise as speed skaters. The finishes in most of the events were close and exciting and the winners were invariably given a good hand by the spectators.

The hockey fixture, between the School and a picked team from Saint Dunstan's University was characterized by thrilling plays, and both teams, considering the soft condition of the ice made an excellent showing. Luck however was against the school boys, and they were forced to swallow defeat to the extent of two goals to nothing. But in territory there was not much to choose between the two teams, and quite often the Saints found themselves hard pressed, and only maintained their lead by dint of the most strenuous efforts.

An enjoyable and amusing feature of the sports were the vaudeville skits by three choicely vaudeville players who in intervals appeared during the intervals in different and gaily colored costumes, and kept the spectators laughing from the time they came on the ice until they left it. Outside Help enlisted to Improve Transportation

During the recent visit to this city of Mr. F. C. Cornell, Maritime Traffic Expert, he had a conference with Mr. J. O. Hyndman, President of the Associated Boards of Trade with reference to transportation matters generally, but especially between Sackville and Prince Edward Island points, including the car ferry service. Mr. Cornell had a good opportunity of studying conditions for himself as he spent a night on the car-ferry detained in the Straits. Mr. Cornell since his return to Moncton has been busy and telegraphed Mr. Hyndman yesterday that "immediate action is being taken to insure proper restaurant service on Car-ferry to meet winter conditions. Mr. Cornell unhesitatingly denounced the discrimination against Prince Edward Island in the matter of transportation service for passengers. He has offered to cooperate in every possible way in an endeavour to procure a better service. It may also be stated that Mr. Hyndman has been in communication with Mr. Robert Forke, M. P., the "key-man" at Ottawa, who also has offered his assistance in procuring a better service. He has been fully informed by Mr. Hyndman as to existing conditions and has expressed his sympathy and willingness to assist in bringing about a much needed improvement. In this connection also Mr. Cornell has promised to give Mr. Forke a report of the whole situation including his own personal experience in travelling to and from the island.

This help, which may be called "outside help" should greatly strengthen the island claim for the "adequate and continuous service, summer and winter" promised at the time of confederation. There is no time like the present, when conditions are at their worst, to bring to the attention of the authorities our most essential needs which are so vital to our progress and prosperity.

With this offer of co-operation our members at Ottawa should have no time in presenting and pressing the island's claim for the second category and insisting upon the necessary appropriation being made during the present session.
