C. N. R. Estimates Tabled In House

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, April 11.-Parliamentary sanction for the issuance of guaranteed securities amounting to \$3,750,000 is sought in the 1929 estimates of the Canadian National Railway, tabled in the House of Commons tonight by Hon. James A. Robb, Minister of Finance. The estimates which cover the company's programme of construction and betterment provide for an outlay of \$3,750,000 for general additions and improvements on the system, while equipment payments amount to \$6,313,400. The amount requested would also provide for a sinking fund.

On Prince Edward Island work will proceed towards the completion of standardization of gauge. The last section, the Murray Harbor subdivision, will be changed from narrow to standard gauge. It is proposed to extend local freight facilities at various points over the system and funds amounting to \$2,620,000 are required for the development and extension of terminals and freight yards. One such project is at Charlottetown, P. E. I., for extension of terminals and erection of an engine house.

legislate in the best interests of the citizens. He could not see why Mr. LePage should take objection.

Mr. LePage asked why the Legislature should give the City more power than it would take itself in collecting taxes. The Dominion Government do not ask for permission for an assessor to examine a man's books, nor do the Provincial Government. Why then should the City? The Provincial Government had been forced to have similar provisions struck out.

Dr. MacMillan said that the schedule objected to was nothing new. The City had had it in force for the last twenty-five years.

Mr. LePage did not see, even if it were in force, why it should be re-enacted.

Hon. J. D. Stewart said that, if Mr. LePage would examine the Dominion and Provincial Acts he would find similar schedules there.

Mr. Wright also drew attention to the fact that similar schedules were used by the Dominion and Provincial Governments.

Dr. MacMillan said that he represented the citizens of Charlottetown. This bug-a-boo of injustice had nothing to do with it.

Hon. Peter Sinclair also thought the declaration very similar to that under the provincial act - except that it did not require a witness. He felt the City of Charlottetown knew their own business.

Mr. LePage withdrew his amendment.

Dr. MacMillan said that this provision also had been in force for a quarter of a century, and no objection had been taken.

Mr. LePage thought the penalty should remain at twenty dollars as formerly. Why should we put laws on the statute books which can't be enforced.

The clause in question was so amended as to reduce the penalty from \$50.00 to not more than \$20.00 for making a false statement of income, or for failure or neglect to make one.

Hon. B. W. LePage took exception to subsection b of section 85, claiming that the old act restricted taxation for education to \$5.00 but this seemed to give unlimited power of taxation.

Progress on the bill was reported. An act to incorporate the Scales Hydro Electric Company received its second reading and the House went into committee of the whole to consider it.

At 1 o'clock the House took recess.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The discussion, in committee of the whole of the act to incorporate the Scales Hydro Electric Company was continued.

Hon. J. D. Stewart, said with reference to clause 16, they had no right to compel an adjoining owner to sell his land. All that should be done is to provide confiscation to the owner, and, for the company, the right to flood it.

The clause was allowed to stand. Dr. W. J. MacMillan and Hon. J. D. Stewart objected to clause 17 of the act which, if a town or municipality had given the company a franchise, debarred other parties from putting wires on the street in competition Mr. Stewart was of the opinion that no such legislation should be passed.

Mr. Angus MacPhee also took exception to the clause. The Premier maintained that unless some concession was given, there was very little encouragement for such companies to form. Mr. Stewart pointed out that it would prevent private parties from running the wires of the "Deloid" system, say, from their house to their store, or other building. Mr. Arsenault and Mr. Wright also joined in the discussion. The bill was withdrawn from committee, progress being reported, with leave to sit again. The House, in committee of the whole next took into consideration an act to amend the Road Act, 1928. The House then went into committee of the whole in regard to supply.

in continuing his address, emphasized again the necessity for a colonization and immigration department.

The speaker pointed out that, notwithstanding its pre-election promise to say about old age pensions. He felt, the Government had nothing felt the House was entitled to more information on the matter than the Government's statement, that owing to limited revenue, it was impossible at present, to establish Old Age Pensions. All agree that there are a certain number of aged poor in the Province. The Federal Government will co-operate fifty-fifty, and the Provincial Government should take some action, if only to investigate the matter.

EDUCATION

A compromise has now been arranged between the teachers and the government - which is that a committee is to be appointed to consider the whole educational question, and to adjudicate on the question of teachers' salaries.

The Premier had spoken of the low salary of the Premier. He gets \$2000 as Premier, \$1500 as Attorney General, a sessional indemnity, nearly equal to the average teacher's salary; an indemnity as a Falconwood trustee; travelling expenses and a fine car. He scored the Premier for his strictures on the former Premier for having that same official car. Mr. McLure thought that on the average teachers' salaries were not high enough. Good teachers were leaving the profession because it did not afford a living wage.

The speaker believed that there was a certain sympathy without the province, notwithstanding what had been said by Government speakers. He criticized the inaction of the government in view of the teachers' request for an increase a year ago. When the commission presents its findings, the Government should take immediate action.

PROHIBITION

Mr. McLure criticized the Government for its manifest failure to enforce the Prohibition Act with the rigour they had promised. What do we find? A senator states that the smuggling is such as to demoralize the people. And before the election the Liberals promised that all smuggling would be put a stop to. But last summer smuggling was more rampant than ever - as shown by a news item in the Liberal press.

The Honourable Member from Rustico need not go out of Charlottetown to see men come out of liquor shops with three bottles of rum in ten minutes.

The speaker had seen three members of the House do so only the other way.

Hon. B. W. LePage rose to a point of order and demanded that the speaker either give the names of the hon. members or retract the statement. He, at least, didn't buy any, he said.

Mr. McLure said the information could be obtained by looking over the vendor's records in the last ten days. The buying of the liquor, both in this case and in New Brunswick, was quite legal.

No hon. member believed that \$130,000 worth of liquor was used for medicinal purposes - \$1.50 per capita per year. And it is a safe bet that five times that amount is consumed.

The ex-president of the Temperance Alliance had, in a lecture delivered in a church, charged the Saunders Government, with failure to enforce Prohibition. And the charges remain unanswered.

With regard to the debt of the Province, Mr. McLure said it was increasing every year. And last year it had increased by over \$200,000; an external audit which should have been held would show \$40,000 more. He quoted an example to show the necessity of an external audit. The Liquor Commission should have \$80,000 assets on hand, not shown. And there may be other similar assets not shown.

There are whisperings about increased taxation due to the necessity of funding our growing debts and the interest on them, which now amounts to \$117,000 per year.

This should not be, when both parties are committed to reducing taxation. He challenged the Liberals who praised the poll tax to dare to put it on the books again. The records show that the Liberal Government is the "D.T." (debt and taxation) Government 90 per cent of the deficits and 95 per cent of the taxes came about under Liberal rule.

PUBLIC WORKS

Mr. McLure commended the Minister of Public Works for repenting of the error of his ways in departing from the road drag system, and following up the Stewart Government's policy by inaugurating them once more. He marvelled, however, at the Minister of Public Works, for that the road machinery, it appeared was today worth more than he paid for it.

Mr. McLure repudiated the statement that the car operation can be overdone. Two common forms of this are insisting upon too tight an adjustment of the timing chain and too close a setting of the valves. The former puts the chain under a tension that may prove too great. Following up valve noises too religiously is likely to be followed by rapid deterioration of the valves.

TRY OIL ON WHISTLE

A drop or two of oil is the most likely remedy for the whistle that seems to emanate from the windshield anchor bolts.

BE CAREFUL IN PARKING

When parking, don't jam a front or rear wheel into the curb. The practice of "finding the curb" by striking it with a tire is a costly one in that it hastens depreciation not only of the tires themselves but loosens the steering apparatus. Motorists should learn to judge distances more accurately, making that physical contact unnecessary.

ALCOHOL DOES TRICK

Cleaning the celluloid of the open car curtains always seem such a difficult job that the car owner passes it by. As a matter of fact, the job is simple. A little alcohol will do the trick. It is a good idea, too, to clean the celluloid in this fashion before putting the curtains away.

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That Car of Yours

BY WILLIAM ULLMAN Heart-to-Heart Talks With Automobile Owners and Drivers on How to Get the Most Out of Their Cars at the Least Expense.

NEW HOSE CONNECTIONS

When the cooling system is filled with water, hose connections are disintegrated and this tends to make them porous. The slightest indication that this has happened should suggest replacement.

GOOD WETTING HELPS

In washing the car, it pays to be generous with the amount of water sprayed upon the wheels. In addition to cleaning them it nullifies the normal shrinkage of the spokes.
