BOSTON SHAKEN BY EARTHQUAKE

BOSTON, August 19.—A slight earthquake shock was felt by a number of cities and towns south of Boston, at 8.30 o'clock to-night.

Brookton residents, recalling the disastrous boiler explosion at a shoe factory several years ago, thought it was at first a similar occurrence, and for half an hour telephone lines were busy.

The quake was also felt in Dedham, Medford, Hyde Park, Hingham, Houghton, North East Quincy, Canton, Needham, Norwood and West Roxbury. In all these places the rumbling was distinct and jarred buildings but so far as reported no damage was caused.

No shock was felt in New Bedford or vicinity. Dorchester and West Roxbury felt it slightly.

An earthquake shook Aroostook County, Maine, villages and places in north-western New Brunswick ten days ago but no damage was done.

Rev. Benjamin Chappell, who was expected to arrive here this evening on a visit to his native home, has received an urgent letter from Tokio, Japan, which has entirely changed his arrangements, but still he hopes to make a flying visit to Charlottetown before leaving for the far east.

There was a good north-westerly wind during the early part of the race, but as the yachts were on the last leg and heading for the finish, the wind shifted to eastward, falling light, so that the stern yachts were seriously handicapped.

The elapsed time of the sloop Avoncar was 2 hours, 59 minutes, 8 seconds, and of the schooner Queen 3 hours, 4 minutes and 47 seconds over the course of 28 miles.

TWO BOATS WIN VANDERBILT CUP

MARBLEHEAD, August 19.—J. Roger Maxwell's schooner Queen and the sloop Avoncar, owned by Roberts W. Emmons, second, won the Commodore's cups offered by Commander Cornelius Vanderbilt for the final race of the New York Yacht Club series to-day.

PROHIBITIONISTS NOMINATE MAN.

CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 18.—At Music Hall this evening, in the presence of a large and enthusiastic audience, Eugene W. Chafin, of Chicago, accepted the nomination for the presidency by the Prohibition party.

The address formally notifying Mr. Chafin of his election, was made by Professor Chas. Scanlon, of Pittsburg, on behalf of the committee on notification.

"You are not asked," said Mr. Scanlon, turning to Mr. Chafin, "to lead a forlorn hope. The final issue of this struggle is not now or ever has been in doubt. The principles advocated by the Prohibition party are as certain to prevail as time is to continue."

Prolonged applause greeted Mr. Chafin as he accepted the honor. Mr. Chafin in beginning dwelt on party strife over false issues for the sake of obtaining office. Continuing, he said: "If one on more political parties are to be kept in power twenty-five or fifty years, each succeeding administration carrying out the policy of the past and refusing to enact into the law the progress demanded, then such party or parties have violated the very spirit of the constitution and turned out democracy into despotism, making the political boss dictator."

Is it possible to cultivate such a pure friendship as existed between David and Jonathan, or is it necessarily a spontaneous development?

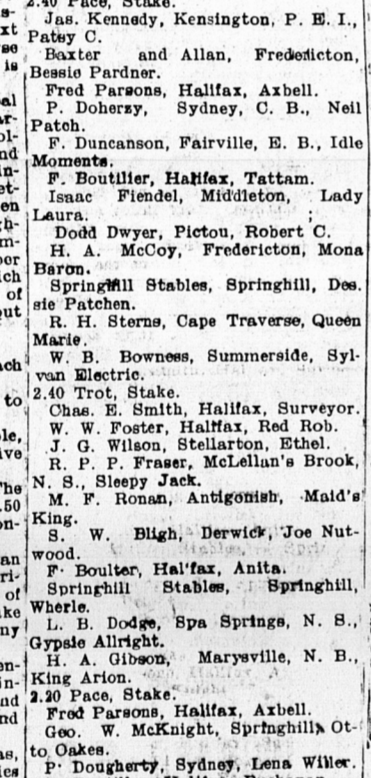
Is such love and friendship as existed between David and Jonathan, possible to two persons who are irreligious?

LONDON, Aug. 18.—It is announced that Winston Spencer Churchill, president of the Board of Trade, with marry Clementine, daughter of the late Sir Henry Hontague Hoizer, who for thirty-two years was secretary of Lloyds.

It is expected that the wedding will take place in about a month at St. Margaret's, Westminster. Miss Eclair is one of the most charming and accomplished girls in London society. Her father was a famous soldier and war correspondent, and her mother a daughter of one of the Earls of Arille.

IS SEVERE ON AMBIDEXTERITY.

LONDON, Aug. 18.—Dr. Sir James Crichton-Browne, lecturing at Cambridge on ambidexterity, said that in the present movement in favor thereof he fancied he detected some of the old taint of faddism. Ambidexterity on a large scale, he declared, was impossible and undesirable.

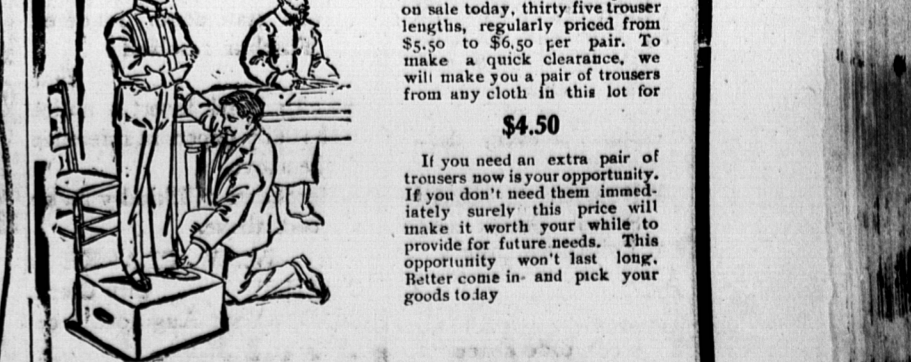
