

**EXILED BECAUSE HE LOVES A CAR**

From the Montreal Star of Nov. 1.—That there exists a thickly populated, civilized and otherwise progressive part of the Western Hemisphere, rigidly closed to automobiles, is a fact of which the average motorist is probably unaware. Such is the case, however. In the rich agricultural province of Prince Edward Island, motor cars remain legally listed with wild animals of destructive tastes, riots, revolutions, and similar disturbances. Should one appear on the street, the peaceful islander would probably call out the militia.  
This strange condition is recalled each year to the attention of a well-known auto firm by the appearance at its Canadian factory of a Prince Edward Islander, Donald McDonald.  
Each fall after Mr. McDonald's crops have been harvested, he puts his family on the Montreal boat and starts for Walkerville, where he buys a new touring car. Mother McDonald and the little McDonalds pile in; father McDonald takes the wheel and they roll away, first for a trip through Ontario and New York, later for a long run into the Sunbelt South. Mr. McDonald sells his car and takes the boat for home, ready for the season's work.  
The factory annually looks forward to Mr. McDonald's advent, which is always within a week of the first frost.  
Mr. McDonald deeply regrets the fact that his love for motoring implies an annual exile from home and native land. He says that the present conditions is due to two factors—the conservatism of the islanders, and the presence in the early history of motoring, of a number of reckless drivers who visited the island during the summer touring season.  
"I was essentially a farming province," he says, "and nearly all of our own well-bred horses. The first autos caused a lot of runaways, and one or two had tragic ends. Our legislators refused to wait until our horses could be schooled to the motor car, but went ahead and barred cars from the island. Now, though Charlottetown and the other cities strongly favor repealing the law, the country influence is always strong enough to sustain it. It's a shame, too, for there isn't a finer land for motoring in the world. The island is the most thickly populated, as well as the wealthiest, per capital province of Canada, and is traversed everywhere in its 130 miles of length by fine post roads. A prettier stretch of farmland, sea and richer doesn't exist anywhere on earth."  
Now and then some American or European manufacturer, ignorant of the local embargo, comes into the Prince Edward Island papers with an advertising campaign. On such occasions progressive men like Mr. McDonald find their emotions too varied to permit of analysis.  
Incidentally, although families average nearly six members each, the population of the island is steadily decreasing—a fact which may or may not be connected with the embargo on automobiles.
