THE AMBULANCE.—Mr. Wright's ambulance was out twice yesterday, in the morning to take Mrs. Callaghan to the Charlottetown Hospital and in the afternoon to take Mr. Geo. Proid, Loyalist, from the P. E. I. Hospital to the train on his way home.

Rev. Neil McLaughlin is the president of the N. B. and P. E. I. Conference, which meets this year in Charlottetown, P. E. I.

As has been remarked before he is the right man in the right place."

THE INSTITUTE meeting at New Glasgow on the 17th was a pleasing and profitable one. After the ordinary routine of business, the chairman, Mr. E. W. Semple introduced Prof. Reid, Provincial Live Stock Instructor, and asked him to address the meeting. Mr. Reid in his opening remarks dealt with the fertility of the soil, and the best way of maintaining it. The grain-farmer is the soil miner and sells with each ton of hay or bushel of grain a part of his most valuable asset, the fertility of the soil. This gradually reduces the earning power of the farm until a system of renovation is necessary as facts and figures were shown to prove. Stock-raising is the best and most reliable means of not only retaining the farm in its original state of fertility, but is the most economical means of marketing farm crops, by selling live stock or live stock products. A thorough dealing with the subject of dairy cattle formed the main part of the talk. Starting with the calf, the system to be adopted in feeding, and the care and treatment advisable under average conditions were dealt with in an instructive manner. The development of the heifer is of important consideration in order that the greatest returns be forthcoming during her later life, and not only from this standpoint but that the size of the cows is maintained. The proper feeding of the dairy cow is an important point, and especially that part when the cow is producing the season's flow of milk. A thorough dealing with this subject was appreciated by all and especially the summer feeding system of growing the crops to supplement the pasture. The marketing of a high producing herd and especially the use of a pure bred sire was mentioned of high value. Mr. Reid spoke for nearly two hours and was followed by the closest attention of the audience, answering many questions, evidencing the interest taken in every line of his subject. At the close a number expressed their high appreciation of the manner Mr. Reid treated his subject, and the meeting unanimously presented him a hearty vote of thanks for the valuable information, which was suitably acknowledged. Mr. Adam Brown was the Secretary of the meeting.

IMMIGRATION.—In 1911 there came into Canada, thru ocean ports, 219,267. The Maritime Provinces, Quebec and Ontario received 120,296 of these people. The total from the United States in that year was 131,114 and the above mentioned Provinces got 46,699. These figures show that for the past two years almost 50 per cent of our immigration has settled in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, P. E. Island, Quebec and Ontario and the balance has been distributed in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta, British Columbia and the Yukon: so these Eastern Provinces are fully holding their own with the great West.
