Regan, K.C., president of the New Brunswick Automobile Association, at a meeting held here last night, referring to the cost of gasoline to the consumer in New Brunswick, said he felt it was time for the members of the Association to get together and form a committee to thoroughly investigate the present situation with a view to getting cheaper gasoline.

Speaking of the retail price of gasoline in New Brunswick the chairman said he was of opinion the amount charged to the auto owners

was too much, and he had been supplied with figures from a reliable source which showed that motor fuel could be landed in Saint John and profitably sold at the rate of 22 cents per gallon.

Some days ago an advance notice was given to the press concerning a proposed Conference on Social Welfare. Plans are now well under way and a list of the visiting speakers will be given from time to time. The Conference will deal with certain specific problems, not attempting to cover too wide a field. The object of such Conference is to stimulate interest in these various fields of welfare work, by bringing to our Province specialists in these various fields who will give the benefit of their rich experience;

Dalzell, specialist in Housing and Town Planning. Rev. J. Phillips Jones, the General Secretary of the Social Service Council of Canada. Welfare Organizations are requested to send delegates.
