LISGAR ELECTION TRIAL SET.

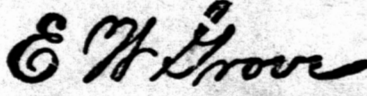
WINNIPEG, June 3.—(Special).—The Lisgar election trial is set for June 19 at Carmen.

THE meeting of the Study Class of the Canadian Historical and Literary Society of Prince Edward Island took place at Government House last evening. As it was the last meeting of the season and one of general interest, owing to the subject being Prince Edward Island the members decided to hold it in the evening and invite all the members of the general society and also the officers of the Natural History and Antiquarian Society of P. E. Island.

In order that those present might understand the work done the Secretary, Miss Lena White, read the minutes of the preceding meetings. This was followed by a ballad beautifully sung by Miss Mary Warburton, typical of the quaint old English style, and composed some thirty years ago by an Islander of famous musical ability, the Rev. C. Harry Stewart, now residing in London. Miss Warburton also sang by urgent request "Auld Scotch Songs" with much sweetness and expression. Mrs. Nash read a paper which was listened to with keen interest by all present. The History of Prince Edward Island is divided into two periods, first from its discovery by Europeans till its cession to the British Crown in 1763. Second from 1763 until the present time. Mrs. Nash dealt with the Island while it was a part of the Dominion of New France. His Honor Lieutenant-Governor McIntyre congratulated the writer on her success and then told some interesting anecdotes about the Island. He was followed by others in the order named: Mr. John Newson and Miss Ethel Palmer who read a deed of 1800 appointing her grandfather Adjutant-General of P. E. I.; Miss Peters, who made a very pathetic plea for the Indian whose home the pale face has wrested from him; Mr. Duffy, Mr. Cotton, Mr. Nash and Mrs. Gardner.

At the close of the discussion Mrs. Bartlett presented the President, Mrs. Gardner, with a bouquet of exquisite carnations and an address, touching on the work the "Study Class" had done and the untiring efforts of the President to make it a success. Mrs. McIntyre kindly invited the class to hold their opening meeting in October at Government House.

SERIOUS ROW FOLLOWS
