He came to Moncton on his birthplace at River John, N.S., and joined the railway service as blacksmith's helper, later becoming a blacksmith from which he retired about thirty years ago. The centenarian railroader enjoys good eyesight and his mind is as sharp as ever. He is reading and smoking his pipe. While in his nineties he thought nothing of walking several miles daily. There are four children living, also six grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

LOSS AND DAMAGE PREVENTION

MONCTON, N.B.—With a view to eliminating loss and damage in the handling of freight shipments, permanent committees are being set up among employees at all the larger stations on the Canadian National Railway to effect improvements in the handling of freight. At a recent meeting held in Moncton such a loss and damage prevention committee was organized and in this connection the railways have underway a campaign to gain the co-operation of shippers for the proper marking and packaging of freight shipments to lessen the possibility of packages going astray and to ensure that containers are of sufficient strength to protect the contents, and that they are properly secured.
