Welshmen Pull Upset, Score 5-4 Victory Over S. D. U. In League Game

Gordon Bennett's Prince of Wales College Welshmen pulled the biggest upset in Island Intermediate Hockey League play to date when they nosed out the second-place Saint Dunstan's University pucksters 5-4 last night at the Forum to keep their playoff hopes alive.

Their victory was the second of the season in eight starts and moves them up to within two points of fourth-place Summerside Crystals whom they have to overtake to make a playoff spot. The loss for the Saints was their third in eight starts, and left them in a second place tie with Victorias.

Coming up with their best performance in league play to date, the Welshmen held a 1-0 lead at the end of the first period, and outshooting their opponents three to two in the middle frame held a 4-2 advantage entering the final session. Coming up with two quick goals by the 7:32 mark of the closing session, the Saints tied the score and left the outcome of the game in doubt for the first time in the game, but the Welshmen retaliated about two minutes later for the winning tally. Red Howatt got the winning counter when Gus Downe sent him in the clear with a smart pass from centre ice to the opposing blueline.

Downe, MacLean, Nicholson, MacDonald and Howatt were the goalkeepers for the Welshmen accounting for one each, while Desrosiers was the leading goaltender for Saints with a brace. Rodgers and Houde snared one each for the other two Saints goals.

Although the Welshmen outscored the Saints in the first two periods, the University boys were really in the play all the way, and except for some really smart goal-tending on the part of youthful Don Simmons in the P.W.C. case, particularly in the second and third periods, the outcome might have been different than it was. The young relief goalie came up with some stellar saves.

But there is no taking away from the Welshmen the fact that they played really smart-passing hockey to earn their victory and came up with some neat scoring plays.

The third period was the hottest session of the game and came up with some very exciting moments, particularly after the Saints had tied up the score, and both teams broke wide-open on the play in an effort to break the dead-lock. Both teams came up with fast breaking scoring attacks and both goalies, Strain and Simmons, had to make some smart moves to keep down the scoring.

The Welshmen finally got the winning goal when Gus Downe, carrying his own blueline to centre, down a perfect pass to Howatt on the right wing, who sailed

Change Of Dates In Barbara Ann Show



In connection with the change of dates of the appearance here of the Barbara Ann Scott Show the management of the Charlottetown Forum has given the following information.

Readers will recall that some weeks ago the Canadian National Railways announced a drastic reduction in railway service due to a shortage of coal. As a result the Barbara Ann Scott Show has been obliged with much regret to completely revise its entire Maritime itinerary. Along with the good faith in and the trustworthiness of the management of the show, each town holds a legal contract which guarantees the appearance of the Skating Sensations of 1950. These contracts were negotiated before the Railway curtailment of its services, and the resultant changes in dates were not due to either the show management or the towns concerned.

The new dates announced for Charlottetown are Friday and Saturday, March 3rd and 4th. Tickets held by spectators will be valid for these dates.

The tour of Barbara Ann across Canada has been a spectacular success. More than 600,000 persons

have already viewed the performance. Her Maritime program could easily be extended to two months so great is the demand from various centres which unfortunately cannot be filled. After her present eastern schedule she will return to Ontario to perform repeat programmes in different cities where she has already appeared.

Completing the latter she will come back east to fill engagements in Moncton and Halifax late in April.

While there is regret that the whole schedule in the Maritimes had to be revised, there is general satisfaction that our people will have an opportunity to see the Canadian and World Champion in action along with her star-studded cast. Mr. Gorman, the noted promoter of Ottawa, and head of the show will be here personally. His parents were born in this province.

One happy result of the change has been that the Forum management has been successful in obtaining a matinee performance for the children on Saturday afternoon, March 4th. Tickets for the matinee will be sold on the day of the matinee at reduced prices for children.
