## Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land, and each three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 20 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in certain conditions. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$20 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after entering homestead upon and cultivation of the land. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain conditions. Price \$50 per acre. Duties—Six months in each of three years. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, stony or stony land.
