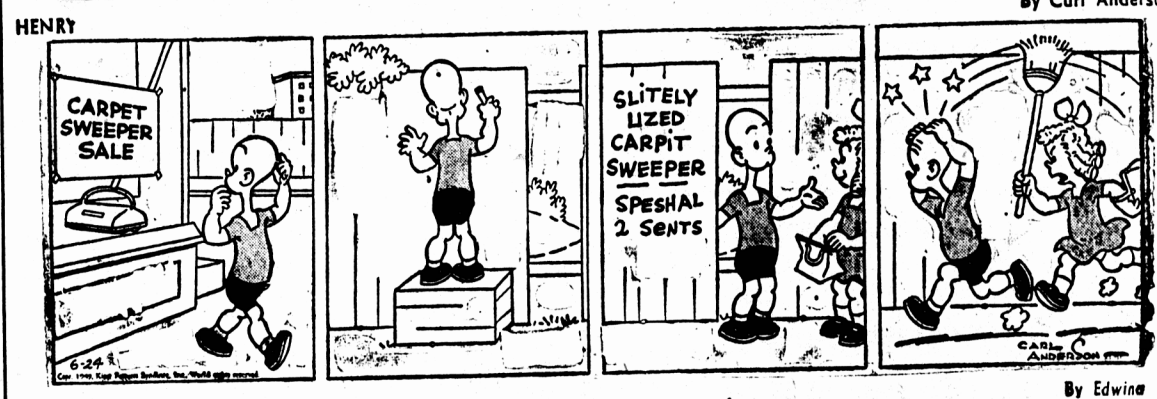
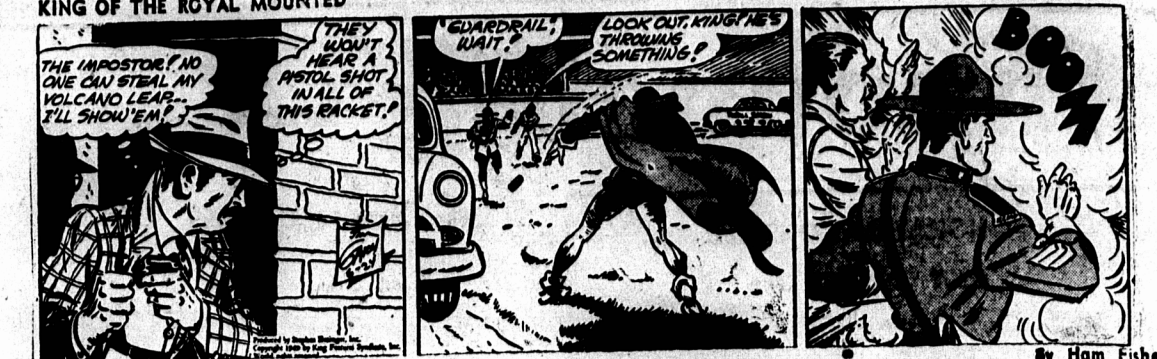

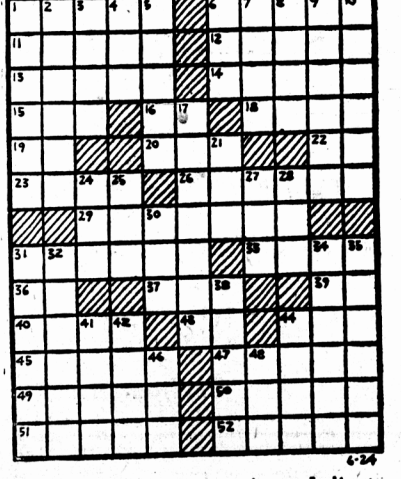

Contract Bridge

A GOOD RECOVERY
 It is not always possible to find the "killing" opening lead, but that may not be necessary. Observe this case:

South dealer.
 Both sides vulnerable.

♠ A 9 5
 ♥ Q 10 9 3
 ♦ A 7
 ♣ 6 5 2

♠ 8 2
 ♥ K 6 5 4
 ♦ K J 9 5
 ♣ 3

♠ 7 6 4
 ♥ Q 8
 ♦ A Q J 7
 ♣ K 8 4

The bidding:
 South West North East
 1♠ Pass 1NT Pass
 3♠ Pass 4♠ Pass

South's semi-forcing rebid was questionable, at best, because of his large number of losers.

If West had guessed a diamond opening, South's position would have been hopeless, but, not unnaturally, West preferred to open the club ten. East put up the ace and, hoping that the lead had been a singleton, returned the club queen. Declarer won, cashed the king and queen of trumps, then, since he needed the spot ace in dummy as an entry, he laid down the ace and seven of hearts.

West was ready for this play. He saw that if he put up the heart king, East's jack would later drop heart tricks. (East was marked with the jack, because, if South had held that card, he would have led it.) South's strong bidding had clearly indicated that he had the ace of diamonds; therefore, no tricks could be quickly collected by the defense in that suit.

All this reasoning had taken West only a couple of seconds, and when the heart seven was led toward dummy, he played low without hesitation. Declarer made the proper play under the circumstances. To put up the heart queen would do him no good, even if he held (unless the jack miraculously dropped under it), and therefore South finessed the nine. East won, cashed his club trick, then shifted to diamonds, and South went down two tricks.
